A4 Wall Calendars are just £5 and will feature all your favourite women's players.





Fara Williams

On Wednesday, October 6, the first inductee to the Hall of Fame.

A statement said: "The newly launched Barclays FA Women's Super League Hall of Fame is delighted to announce Fara Williams as the first inductee of 2021."



Williams, who is England's record cap holder, has had an illustrious career in the domestic game having played every season of the Barclays FA Women's Super League before her retirement this year, playing for clubs including Everton, Liverpool, Arsenal and Reading.

Widely regarded as one of this country's most gifted midfielders, Williams has been an integral part of every club she has played at, winning two Barclays FA Women's Super League titles during her time at Liverpool.

Ahead of the current season, Williams record of 147 appearances in the league was fifth overall, while she was fourth on the all-time list for assists (28) and second for the number of chances created (266).

The Barclays FA Women's Super League Hall of Fame expert selection panel agreed that Williams was a worthy inductee based on her achievements in the league, but also the impact she has had on the women's game during a career that spanned over 20 years.

Chair of the Barclays FA Women's Super League Hall of Fame panel, Kelly Simmons, said: "Induction into the Barclays FA Women's Super League Hall of Fame is the highest individual honour offered by the league and I am delighted that Fara is our first inductee.

"She is one of those players that can do something special when you least expect it, and because of that, as well as having been an ever present in the Barclays FA Women's Super League prior to her retirement, the panel was unanimous in her being inducted.

"Not only was she an incredible player, but she is a wonderful person, and she is fully deserving of her induction into the inaugural Barclays FA Women's Super League Hall of Fame. Congratulations Fara."

Rachel Yankey



Rachel Yankey was announced as the second inductee.

Yankey is one of the country's most decorated players having won every competition available with Arsenal, which included two FA Women's Super League titles in 2011 and 2012.

Many may also recall her starring role in the very first FA

Women's Continental Tyres League Cup Final, when she scored a double in the Gunners' 4-1 win over Birmingham City — one of them a stunning volley.

A skilful winger with a wand of a left-foot, Yankey was a standout in the inaugural season of the FA Women's Super league, creating more chances than any other player during her team's title winning campaign.

Her two league titles in the FA Women's Super League would contribute to an overall tally of eight during her career.

The Barclays FA Women's Super League Hall of Fame expert selection panel agreed that Yankey was a worthy inductee based on her incredible statistic of winning competition available every with Arsenal, and her consistent performances on the pitch.

Suzanne Wrack, journalist and member of the Barclays FA Women's Super League Hall of Fame selection panel, said: "I am delighted that Rachel Yankey has been unveiled as one of the first ever Barclays FA Women's Super League Hall of Fame inductees.

"She was always a player I admired and one of those individuals who you could tell genuinely enjoyed every minute she had on the pitch.

"Watching her as a player was an absolute pleasure and I am thrilled she is taking that knowledge into coaching.

"She is fully deserving of her induction into the inaugural Barclays FA Women's Super League Hall of Fame."

Kelly Smith



Kelly Smith has been announced as the third inductee.

Smith has been a face of the women's game for over a decade and has often been regarded by some as the country's greatest player.

Her return to the FA Women's Super League in 2012 after a spell playing in America, alongside Alex Scott, received huge attention and was seen as a landmark moment for the league to have attracted one of the game's biggest stars back to England.

Starring largely in the No.10 role for club and country, Smith helped her club Arsenal to a league title in 2012, while also playing a starring role in

Women's FA Cup victories in 2014 and 2016 – the latter year her final as a player.

Despite terrible luck with injuries, Smith's career lasted for over 20 years and as well as winning the UEFA Women's Cup pre Barclays FA WSL era, she, for the time being, is England's record goal scorer.

The Barclays FA Women's Super League Hall of Fame expert selection panel agreed that Smith's impact on the women's game during her career and her achievements made her a worthy inductee into this year's Barclays FA Women's Super League Hall of Fame.

Brighton & Hove Albion head coach, ex-player, and member of the Barclays FA Women's Super League Hall of Fame selection panel, Hope Powell, said: "When thinking of my Barclays FA Women's Super League Hall of Fame inductee selection, Kelly Smith was one of the first individuals I thought of.

"There are few words that I can use to describe what she was able to do on the pitch. She was a magician, she made things look so effortless and she just glided across the field with ease.

"Kelly's profile and respect from different parts of the world has been a huge asset in promoting the women's game here. I am delighted that we are able to induct her into the Barclays FA Women's Super League Hall of Fame."

Emma Hayes



Emma Hayes MBE was unveiled as the final inductee into the Hall of Fame for 2021.

The newly launched Barclays FA Women's Super League Hall of Fame is delighted to announce Chelsea head coach Emma Hayes as the final inductee of 2021.

Hayes is the longest serving manager in the Barclays FA Women's Super League and is one of the country's most successful head coaches.

Her record of four league titles surpasses any other manager during the FA Women's Super League era, and she has also established Chelsea as one of Europe's giants during that time, managing some of the world's best players.

She has also won two FA Women's Continental Tyres League Cups and two Women's FA Cups, while she recently passed 150 Barclays FA Women's Super League games in charge of her club.

The Barclays FA Women's Super League Hall of Fame expert selection panel agreed that Hayes was a worthy inductee based on her managerial achievements, but also the impact she has had on the women's game during her career.

Chair of the Barclays FA Women's Super League Hall of Fame panel, Kelly Simmons, said: "Induction into the Hall of Fame is the highest individual honour offered by the league and I am delighted that Emma has been inducted.

"Her record is incredible, but she's so much more than that.

"She's a great ambassador for the league, who works tirelessly behind the scenes, whilst also encouraging the development of coaches.

"She's taken her knowledge into the broadcast world to become a great pundit, and I feel we are really lucky to have her in the league and recognised in the Barclays FA Women's Super League Hall of Fame."

All four inductees were selected by an expert panel that was made up of ex-players, coaches, a former official, journalists and representatives of The FA and Barclays.

Speaking of the Barclays FA Women's Super League Hall of Fame selection panel, Kelly Simmons said: "When I was asked to chair the selection panel for the Barclays FA Women's Super League Hall of Fame, I knew I wanted a variety of opinions and individuals to help me decide on who to induct.

"They have all made a significant impact on the women's game, so their

opinions and votes have been invaluable.

"I'm extremely thankful to the panel for giving up their time to help select the first ever Barclays FA Women's Super League Hall of Fame inductees."

Hayes is the final inductee into the Barclays FA Women's Super League Hall of Fame for 2021, joining Fara Williams, Rachel Yankey and Kelly Smith.

Kirk leaves Everton

"Willie was appointed in December 2018 and has played a key role in the progress of our Women's team and structure, making the Club more competitive in the Barclays FA WSL and reaching the 2020 FA Cup final.

"Everton is aiming to have a new manager in post ahead of the Club's next match away to Leicester City in the Continental Cup on 3 November."

Willie Kirk has made the following statement after leaving his position as manager of Everton Women:

"I am thankful to the Club for the opportunity that they gave me three years ago. During that time, we have made tremendous progress both on and off the pitch and I leave the Club in a better place. Without a doubt, the highlight was the FA Cup final less than a year ago, a memory that will stay with me forever.

"Unfortunately, this season has not started the way we anticipated, due to a very tough opening fixture list and the re-building of a squad with eight new players.

"I have no doubt the talented squad that I leave behind can go on to have a very bright future.

"I wish the Club, the staff and the players my very best wishes."

Campbell honoured with lifetime achievement award



Baroness Sue Campbell has been celebrated for her incredible work transforming the life chances of young people.

She received the Lifetime Contribution to Education Award from the Teaching Awards Trust recognition of her work to emphasize the importance on the value of sport to children and young people, and supporting gain schools to resources to offer sporting opportunities.

Baroness Campbell began as a physical education teacher at Whalley Range High School in Manchester, in a career which took her to Chief Executive of the Youth Sports Trust, Chair of UK Sport and her current role as The Football Association's Director of Women's Football.

She was presented with the award at the postponed 2020 celebration for the Pearson National Teaching Award winners.

This was organised to celebrate last year's award winners, some of the finest teachers, lecturers and education staff in the country, who were unable to be honoured in person last year due to the pandemic.

This is the award that is given annually by the

board of the Teaching Awards Trust to exceptional individuals who have dedicated their lives to education and who have made an outstanding contribution to improving the lives of children and young people across the UK.

Previous winners of the award include Sir Tim Brighouse, the former chief commissioner for schools, and Fred Jarvis MBE.

Pearson National Teaching Awards is an annual celebration of exceptional teachers, founded in 1998 by Lord Puttnam to recognise the life-changing impact an inspirational



teacher can have on the lives of the young people they teach.

Baroness Sue Campbell said: "Thank you to Steve and everyone at The Teaching Awards Trust for this honour.

"I have always been passionate about the importance of sport in changing lives for the better, and spent my career trying to make this happen across the country.

Gray becomes the first player to move permanently from the development squad to the First team following club's implantation of the full youth pathway scheme.

Jess makes the transition having spent one season in our development squad and through her hard work has earned this opportunity."

University of Greenwich become Charlton Athletic's front-of-shirt sponsor

The Potential of Women's Sport:

Brands and Sports Need to think differently about women's sport

New research from The Space Between shows that women's sport fans have the potential to be more valuable than men's sport fans.

Sports marketing agency, The Space Between, today released new research comparing the attitudes and behaviours of women's sport fans and men's sport fans.

The research shows that fans of women's sport are more values-driven and purposeful, quicker adopters of tech and far more likely to buy the product of brand sponsors than fans of men's sport.

The Space Between commissioned the research from Savanta to offer new insight into fans of women's

sport that could demonstrate to brands and rights holders the untapped value in women's sport audiences and prompt the sports and marketing sector to think differently about the commercial opportunity.

The findings include:

• Women's sport fans are twice as likely to recall brand sponsors than fans of men's sport and they are 25% more likely to buy brand sponsor products than fans of men's sport.

- 50% of women's sport fans strongly agree that brands should act with purpose and try to make the world a better place, compared to just 20% of sport fans, and men's beliefs strongly these influence the purchasing decisions of women's sport fans.
- 40% of women's sport fans deem it very important for the brand to reflect their values when choosing one brand over another vs. 20% of men's sport fans.
- Women's sport fans are significantly more tech savvy, environmentally conscious and community minded compared to men's sport fans.

Commenting on the rationale for

the research, Adam Raincock, Co-Founder of The Space Between says: "It's time to change the narrative about the commercial and marketing value of women's sport.

"We need to alter the way we look at this audience from a focus on the quantity of the audience to the quality. There is a fundamental difference in how the audience connect with women's sport.

"It's deeper and more meaningful and so therefore brands that get it right have an opportunity to create better and more valuable relationships with these fans.

"The sooner we make this shift the quicker we'll start to realise the real value of women's sport."

Speaking on the findings of the research, Tom Gladstone, Co-Founder of The Space Between says: "To date brands have largely used women's sport as a platform to show their support for equality, female empowerment, inclusivity, but and this risks leaving value on the table.

Women's sport fans have a more progressive, purposeful sense of what is important in society and place greater importance on brands playing a role in health & wellbeing, the environment and sustainability, opening up women's sport to a broader spectrum of brand partners."

There is a large crossover in fans of men's and women's sport. Fans of women's sport are also likely to follow men's sport, so our research – surveying 500 sport fans in the UK aged 16+ – we looked at two separate cohorts to draw out the differences in attitude based on depth of interest in women's sport.

- **1.** Men's Sport Fans defined as only following / watching men's sport.
- **2.** Women's Sport Fans defined as those who are fans of 3 or more women's sports.

Men make up a significant percentage of women's sport fans, and are often more likely to watch women's professional sport than women.

This is reflected in our survey, with men making up 41% of the women's sport fans surveyed, compared with 48% of the men's sport fans surveyed.

Record crowds watch Exeter City beat Plymouth Argyle

1380 spectators packed into St. James Park to see Exeter City beat Plymouth Argyle in a penalty shoutout in the Devon Cup.

It was a perfect day and a perfect advert for women's football, with the Grecians claiming the upset over their Devon rivals, who play in the league above, with fans staying long after the final whistle to celebrate, take selfies with the team, and get autographs from the players it was a joyous and celebratory atmosphere.

"We wanted to give a good game for the crowd and won't get a much better game than that," goal-keeper Abbi Bond told DevonLive.

Official coin launches to start eve





After months of preparation, hundreds of entries, a star-studded panel of judges and a public vote, the official Coin for Respect has launched.

England Football and Nationwide Building Society's Coin for Respect initiative was created to help promote mutual respect on and off the pitch.

The organisations launched a competition that called on children aged 3-17 from across the country to design a coin depicting what respect meant to them, in what would be crowned the first official 'Coin for Respect'.

The coin toss has always been a symbol of fair chance at the start of every game, but until now, no official coin has ever existed.

The coin has now been brought to life with 15,000 distributed to grassroots referees across the country.

500 limited edition coins are also being distributed to celebrities and influential faces in the footballing world, FA and England Football officials and politicians to help spread the message of mutual respect.

The aim is to ensure every game starts with respect.

The winning design from Chloe, a 12-year-old from Wallington, represents the idea that football is for everyone regardless of gender, race, sexuality, and that everyone should be respected on and off the pitch.

Chloe fought off competition from hundreds of other hopefuls to win the public vote after being shortlisted by the judging panel, which included ex-England goalkeeper, David James, EFL referee, Rebecca Welch, and England Lionesses, Beth Mead and Jordan Nobbs.

The first official Coin for Respect match was hosted at Wallington FC, Chloe's home club, on Thursday 7 October between 4-6pm, where the coin was used for the very first time.

The teams were treated to a coaching session from England legend David James and grassroots match official of the

year, Ella Broad, refereed the kick-off match. Now, the coin will be put to use up and down the country by referees at thousands of grassroots matches.

The Coin for Respect campaign, along with the winning coin design, is a part of Nationwide's pledge to ensure one million players, parents and coaches get involved with the England Football Respect campaign by 2023.

David James, ex-England goalkeeper Coin for and Respect ambassador spoke about the competition: "The Coin for Respect campaign is really important as it shines a light on respect in the game and connects with the younger footballers, generation of football fans, football followers, and highlights that respect is something that has to be adhered to.

"Having been involved with this campaign from the very start, I'm so excited that we now have a physical coin to

help carry forward the message of respect.

"Here's hoping I get to play a match where it's used sometime soon. I know I'll be encouraging all of my friends and colleagues to use it to kick off their matches."

Ella Broad, Grassroots Match Official of the Year, spoke about being involved in the launch: "I'm so excited to be involved in the campaign and to have attended the launch event.

"I can't believe that I'm the first person to officially use the coin, and I'll be certain to use it this season. The design is incredibly clever – Chloe has done a great job of creating a design that communicates such an important message.

"I hope that the Coin for Respect campaign and the use of the coin will help to drive mutual respect across the game.

"It's such an important message to spread, and I hope everyone gets on board with it. "Every game starts with a coin toss, and this is a great symbol for the game – it should start with respect, and continue throughout the game, on and off the pitch."

Chloe commented: "I can't believe I'm finally seeing my design come to life!

"The time has come to actually launch the coin, and I couldn't be happier that it was at the club that I play for as well.

"I'm really excited to know that it is going to be used up and down the country and hopefully the message that I wanted to put forward shines through."

Director of Advertising & Marketing at Nationwide Building Society, Paul Hibbs said: "Seeing the campaign come to fruition is something we're really proud of, especially as with it, comes such a positive message.

"It's brilliant to see the coin being used for the first time, hopefully it can inspire mutual respect across the country going forward. 35 "Mutual respect is something that we value at the core of Nationwide in everything we do, so to be able to create something tangible that reflects this in association with England Football has been a great journey for us.

England to welcome Northern Ireland at Wembley

England are to return to Wembley Stadium connected by EE for a 2023 FIFA Women's World Cup qualifier against Northern Ireland.

The match, on Saturday 23 October (5.15pm kick-off), will be the first competitive fixture for the Lionesses at the national stadium since it reopened in 2007.

Wembley has staged two previous England international matches against Germany in November 2014 and November 2019.

The Lionesses last met Northern Ireland at St. George's Park back in February with Ellen White claiming a hat-trick and Ella Toone scoring on her debut in the 6-0 win.

The two countries could also meet at next summer's UEFA Women's EURO in England with the draw for the finals to take place in Manchester on 28 October.

Baroness Sue Campbell, The FA's director of women's football, said: "Having the chance for our England team to play again at Wembley in a competitive fixture is so important.

"From a performance point of view, it will give us the chance to get close to a big-game occasion of the kind we hope our squad will experience at next summer's home UEFA EURO.

"Having had such a challenging 18 months, the day will mean so much to our players and of course we hope the chance to play in front of so many fans will be something truly special.

"We have missed the supporters and let's hope that things are heading in the right direction on that front.

"We want Wembley to feel like home for our England team and we want the players to be able to thrive when they run out to play.

"We are at the start of an exciting season and with Sarina Wiegman coming in as head coach, there is every reason for us to be upbeat for the months ahead."

Under Wiegman, England will return to action when World Cup qualifying begins on Friday 17 September at home to North Macedonia, with the venue still to be confirmed, before travelling to Luxembourg four days later.

October's camp will conclude with a trip to Latvia three days after the Northern Ireland fixture.

November will then see the year's action conclude with two home qualifiers against Austria and Latvia on 27 and 30 November respectively, with the venues for those matches also yet to be confirmed.

The Lionesses last visit to Wembley came in November 2019 when a late German winner saw the visitors win 2-1 in front of an England women record crowd for a home international of 77,768.

The overall record for a women's game on English soil is the 80,023 that saw United States defeat Japan 2-1 to claim gold at London 2012.

Following England's 8-0 victory over North Macedonia and 10-0 triumph away to Luxembourg, England continue to target qualification for the 2023 World Cup in Australia and New Zealand.

England face Group opponents Northern Ireland in their first ever competitive fixture at Wembley Stadium on Saturday 23 October [kick-off: 5:15pm BST], before travelling to Riga to face Latvia at the Daugava Stadium on October [kick-off: 6:30pm BST / 8:30pm EET].

Head coach Sarina Wiegman said: "After a wonderful start to our World Cup qualifying campaign last month, we are incredibly excited to play our first competitive fixture at Wembley Stadium.

"The incredible atmosphere our supporters generated at St Mary's Stadium for our match against North Macedonia gave our players and staff a tremendous lift, so the prospect of playing in front of thousands of fans at our national stadium later this month will be a special moment.

"Northern Ireland have made strong progress in recent years, qualifying earlier this year for the 2022 home UEFA Women's EURO.

"On top of that, their recent 4-0 victory over Latvia shows

The Young Lionesses will start against the Irish next Wednesday [20 October, kickoff 7pm] before taking on Northern Ireland three days later [23 October, kickoff 2pm] on the same day that the senior sides will meet at Wembley Stadium in EURO qualifying.

The group will finish the following Tuesday [26 October, kick-off 1pm] when they face Switzerland with the top three teams progressing to the second round next year.

Wenger and Ellis on the future of the game



FIFA Chief of Global Football Development Arsène Wenger and two-time FIFA Women's World Cup winning coach Jill Ellis, who has assumed the role of FIFA Technical Advisory Group leader for women's football, have stressed their aims of ensuring men's and women's football coexist as of the ongoing part consultation in relation to the future International Match Calendar (IMC).

The IMC sets the dates of national team matches and the days in which the players must be released by their clubs to join international squads.

It therefore has a central role in the sustainable growth of football in all regions of the world and at all levels.

FIFA is hearing from – and will continue to listen over the

coming months – to views and opinions from all key stakeholders, including fans, about how to make the calendar better for each IMC. Men's, women's and youth competitions.

Ahead of a first online summit with FIFA's member associations, which is being chaired by FIFA President Gianni Infantino - one of opportunities several to establish a constructive and open debate, at a global and regional level, over the coming months - both Arsène Wenger and Jill Ellis provided insight to their common approach at the Home of FIFA in Zurich, Switzerland.

"It's critical that we make sure the men's and women's games coexist," said Ellis. "After the [FIFA Women's] World Cup 2019, we saw there were over 1 billion [television] viewers; that there is an appetite out there.

"I think it's important for us to make sure that we grow our footprint, to be bigger.

"So to coexist together with the men's game makes total sense."

Some of the early debate about the consultation process has suggested that any changes to the men's game, could be to the detriment of the women's game. A suggestion the Frenchman is keen to refute.

"[At] the start of my career, [there] was purely the men's football calendar.

Now, of course, the evolution of women's football has brought a necessity to communicate well and to make sure we share the calendar throughout the season.

"That starts with creating space for everybody. That is absolutely vital.

"We have to sit down together and ask: 'When do you play?' and 'When do we play?' and see if we can find a way to make that work," he added.

The progressive competitive imbalance, absence of mandatory rest period for players, the excessive number travels and matches endangering player health and well-being and the constant interruption of domestic leagues disrupting club competitions are some of the topics under the core microscope as part of the IMC consultation process.

In recent years, the growth of women's domestic leagues and the increased volume of international player transfers has exacerbated the same issues, now facing the women's international game.

"Obviously I've been in the global game, but I want to understand everybody's viewpoint at our table," said Ellis.

"To Arsène's point, it is about communication and it's about listening.

"To bring in former players, current players, club coaches, national team coaches.

"You want to understand the lens that they look through.

"When you bring people together and you start to share thoughts and ideas, it truly allows you to have a more complete grasp on what everybody is dealing with and what everybody's challenge is

and what everybody's opportunities are.

"I think it was very important to start this process to understand [questions like] what are the challenges to the Europeans, to the South Americans, to the club coaches, to the national team coaches?

"We want a model that is player-centric.

"Ultimately, that's our game, the player.

"And so making sure that their lens and their voice is represented in this process has been very important."

FIFA committed itself to reviewing the frequency of men's, women's and youth national team competitions after 166 FIFA member associations at the 71st FIFA Congress in May 2021 voted for a feasibility study to be carried out to explore the possible impact of holding the FIFA World Cup and FIFA Women's World Cup every two years.

The long-term goal for FIFA, oft-stated by FIFA President Gianni Infantino, is to have 50 national teams and 50 clubs competing at the highest level of both the men's and women's game, in line with his FIFA Vision (2020-2023).

"You want both parties (the men's and women's game) to be happy and to develop.

"Therefore, I would say that it's important to have a quality organisation on both sides that satisfies everybody," continued Wenger.

"I agree," added Ellis in conclusion. "I think our fan bases cross over. You see women at men's matches, and you see young boys and men at women's matches.

"I agree with Arsène: we want to grow both platforms.

"Ultimately, you want this to truly be a global game.

"Right now, we're still in our processes, we've got a lot of developing countries and nations on the women's side.

"So to see that accelerate is part of our ambitions, so that we (FIFA) have access to everybody."





Team England's Women's Team win first Homeless World Cup 4 Nations Football Tournament



Team England's women's team - managed by Street Soccer London - won the first-ever Homeless World Cup 4 Nations Tournament in Edinburgh this weekend.

The event, in which 64 players were competing, was the first of its kind since the Homeless World Cup in Cardiff in 2019 and Street Soccer founder and chief executive David Duke hopes that the Homeless World Cup will happen again in 2022.

He said: "Congratulations to Team England, who won the women's competition and to Northern Ireland, who won the men's title.

"These competitions mean the world to our players, many of whom have complex lives and challenges, and we're optimistic that the Homeless World Cup, possibly the most inspirational sporting competition in the world, can go ahead again next year."

Fifa fears recent abuse cases are just 'tip of the iceberg'

In recent weeks there have been a number of allegations of abuse in women's football.

These have come from the US, Venezuela and Australia.

Joyce Cook, FIFA's Chief Education and Social Responsibility Officer, told CNN Sport's Amanda Davies that there will probably be similar stories out there, and encourages people to come forward.

"We are incredibly serious about eradicating abuse from sport, from football," Cook said. "We've spoken to a lot of other international sports federations about this topic over the last year.

"And what's clear is that part of ensuring that we have a safe sport means that we also have to provide remedy for those that have been abused, that are being abused and to make sure that any perpetrators not only not welcome but banned from sport."

In a statement sent to CNN, FIFA said the recent reports of abuses in football show it is a "major problem that affects all of us and which cannot be tolerated anymore."

"FIFA has shown that there is a zero tolerance policy for cases of sexual abuses in football: anyone found guilty of misconduct and abuse shall be brought to justice, sanctioned and removed from the game," it said.

"At the same time, the entire global football community needs to do more to prevent such cases from happening and put in place appropriate measures to support the victims."

Venezuela

Accusations of sexual abuse by former Venezuelan national women's football coach Kenneth Zseremeta, the country's Attorney-General Tarek William Saab were announced earlier in October.

Football star Deyna Castellanos and 23 other players published a letter accusing their former coach, Zseremeta, of psychological and sexual abuse, and harassment over sexual orientation.

Zseremeta served as head coach of the Under-17 and Under-20 women national teams until 2017. He is among Venezuela's most successful football coaches of all time, with teams winning the South American Under-17 Football Championship twice, in 2013 and 2016.

Australia

Also in October, Football Australia announced the formation of an independent complaint management process to "enable current and former footballers and staff to bring forward concerns regarding alleged abuse, harassment or bullying in relation to Football Australia's national teams and the A-Leagues."

It comes after former Australia striker Lisa De Vanna revealed she had been the victim of sexual assault, harassment and bullying during her career.

USA

US women's football has been shocked by the allegations that have emerged after former National Women's Soccer League (NWSL) coach Riley was fired by the North Carolina Courage.

An investigative report by The Athletic cites players on the record alleging that for years, Riley used his influence and power to sexually harass players and in one incident, coerce a player into having sex with him.

Riley denied the accusations in the Athletic report. CNN has not been able to reach Riley for comment.

Former NWSL player Mana Shim accused Riley of being a "predator" who "sexually harassed" her, while another former player, Sinead Farrelly, said the damage Riley caused "seeps into every part" of their livelihoods.

When NWSL action did resume, players across multiple games stopped in the sixth minute -- to highlight the six years it took for Shim, Farrelly and others to be heard -- joined together in the center circle, linking arms in a show of solidarity.

Fifa evacuates 100 refugees

At least 20 women footballers are among 100 refugees evacuated by Fifa from Afghanistan.

The group of mainly women and girls, including some who play for the national team, left Kabul on Thursday on a flight bound for Doha, according to the Independent.

Much has been said of the impact on players due to the lockdown, but what about match officials. I took the time to interview Julia Kings, a match official about the lockdown and how it has affected her.

1. How has the lockdown affected your training as a match official?

The main impact was the unexpected break in the football season at the levels that I officiate at. However, I was still able to maintain my fitness through running and home workouts, which actually led to an improvement in my fitness levels.

2. During the last 12/18 months have you managed to do officiate in any matches prior to the start of the 2021/22 season?

In the last 12/18 months I have been able to officiate on quite a few games once grassroots football resumed, including games in the Nottingham Senior League, Tamworth Sunday League and Nottinghamshire Girls and Ladies league.

3. Have you been able to continue your training or has that suffered as well?

Throughout the multiple lockdowns I have been able to continue with training through running. The only time it was affected was on occasions where I had to isolate and therefore could not go on any runs.

4. Do you receive support to help on the mental health side of fitness as a match official, especially in the lockdown?

I have not personally received any mental health support as a match official however I know that there are people within my county FA who are mental health champions that would be able to provide assistance should it be required.

5. .What does a typical week look like in training for a match official? How often do you have to do a fitness test?

As I am currently both a player and a referee my week is usually pretty busy with 2 football training sessions as well as matches at the weekend.

Around this I try to add in a few runs throughout the week to keep on top of my fitness. In terms of fitness tests, they are not necessary for any referee unless going for promotion where they may need to pass an annual fitness test.

6. Do you do anything specific in preparing for a match?

On the morning of a game, I always double check my kit bag, the kick off time, the league rules and the route to the game. Once arriving at a game I undergo the usual pre match routine of introducing myself to the teams, checking kit and ensuring everything is ready for the match to go ahead.

7. Are you looking to gain promotion to the next level of officials this season?

After being promoted to level 5 at the end of last season, this season I am moving onto the women's promotion pathway and am looking to be promoted from 4W to 3W.

8. What do you like about your role as a match official?

One thing I like about being a match official is the different view of a game it gives in contrast to that of a player. I also enjoy the variety of leagues that I officiate in and going to all the different grounds.

9. Would you recommend being a match official?

I would recommend being a match official to anyone, especially if they have an interest in football and are looking to challenge themselves or try something new. Since becoming a match official I feel that it has helped me develop in many ways, including both my confidence and communication.

10. What are you ambitions this season and longer term?

My main ambition this season to is get my promotion on the women's pathway and have an enjoyable season. In the longer term, my aim is to progress as far as I can as a match official.


