Greenwood: It's a real honour

"It's a real honour and if I can inspire just one girl from Bootle to play football then I feel like my job is done!"

That is the message from Bootle Lioness and England Women's Footballer Alex Greenwood as she officially unveiled a huge mural honouring her successes.

The 29-year-old Euro 2022 winning Lioness said she was extremely proud to have a mural commemorating her sporting successes painted onto the front of 320 Stanley Road in Bootle, thanks to joint funding from Sefton Council and REPT Sports.

At the official unveiling on Monday, October 25th crowds of youngsters gathered alongside Alex's family and national media to officially unveil the mural, painted by artist John Culhsaw.

While all eyes are now on the 22ft mural, Alex is keen to use it as an opportunity to push for greater support for young girls in sport.

Alex added: "It's a real honour to have this mural and if I can inspire just one girl from Bootle to play football then I feel like I have done my job!

"I used to walk up and down this street as a kid and it's fantastic to know young girls and boys will walk past [the mural] and hopefully be inspired.

"I've seen a massive shift in mentality towards female sport and women's football since the Euros.

"As a collective we are going to keep asking questions of those higher up and demand more opportunities for little girls and boys in the future.

"I really hope there's another young girl standing here in however many years to come telling the same story."

The mural sits pride of place on the busy Bootle town centre thoroughfare and be seen by thousands of schoolchildren, shoppers and commuters every day.

Alex, a former St Monica's and Savio Salesian pupil, has to remained true her hometown roots and has long been a major influence the advancement women & girls football within Sefton, ensuring she takes time out of her busy footballing career motivate and inspire future generations of sporting stars throughout the borough.

Alex said: "I would like to thank Sefton Council for this mural.

"It's really important for me to be able to send a message to young girls in my area that anything is possible.

"Many of the dreams I had while walking the streets of Bootle and playing on the pitches have come true through hard work and perseverance.

"Characteristics that were formed in Bootle."

Cllr Trish Hardy, Sefton Council's Cabinet Member for Communities and Housing, said: "Alex has always been an inspiration to our sporting youngsters and we were over the moon when she, along with the other amazing Lionesses, brought home the European Championship.

"To be able to honour Alex in this way with a permanent mural in the heart of her hometown is fantastic and I know that the thousands of schoolchildren who will pass by it every day will be inspired just by seeing it.

"I want to take this opportunity to urge all our young sporting stars to take a look at Alex's hard work and dedication to getting where she is today as one of the world's best female footballers. Her progress is a testament to the excellent school and sports facilities we have within Sefton."

Popular Liverpool artist John Culshaw, who rose to fame with his incredible murals of Ringo Starr in Toxteth and Mo Salah in Anfield, designed and painted Alex's mural.

John said: "It was a real honour to be asked to create this mural.

"I think we have a way of getting behind our stars in Liverpool and for a Bootle girl to bring home our nation's first piece of international silverware in 56 years is definitely something to be celebrated!

"What better way to show how proud we are than to have this mural in Alex's hometown.

"It's about young people being able to keep being inspired by our Lionesses.

"They were inspired during the Euros and now they can continuously be inspired every time they walk past."

First inductees announced

Three Women's Super League players have been inducted into the WSL Hall of Fame for 2022.

They join Rachel Yankey, Kelly Smith, Emma Hayes and Fara Williams who were inducted in 2021.

Let's have an in depth look at the new members.

Karen Carney



Carney becomes the fifth individual to be inducted since The FA and lead partner Barclays launched the Hall of Fame last year and is the first of three inductees to be recognised this year.

Nicknamed 'The Wizard,' Carney had an illustrious career that included nine seasons in the Barclays Women's Super League with hometown club Birmingham City and Chelsea.

Over her entire career, she won a number of honours following stints with Birmingham City and Arsenal, as well as with the Chicago Red Stars and Chelsea, which included the infamous 'quadruple' with the Gunners in 2007.

Her honours during her time in the Barclays WSL include topping the league scoring charts with Birmingham in 2014, as well as winning the Vitality Women's FA Cup with the Blues in 2012. She also achieved an impressive league and cup double with Chelsea in 2017/2018.

Earning 144 England Caps places her as the third most capped England Women's international of all time, with her Lionesses career ending following the 2019 FIFA World Cup.

Her skills on the pitch and ability to analyse the game off it have led to opportunities in the broadcast world since she ended her playing career, working on Sky Sports' Barclays WSL coverage, as well as with ITV and Amazon Prime.

Chair of the Barclays WSL Hall of Fame panel, Kelly Simmons, said: "Induction into the Barclays WSL Hall of Fame is the highest individual honour offered by the league and I am delighted that Karen is our first inductee of 2022.

"She played at the very highest level for a prolonged period of time, and her record speaks for itself. She is absolutely deserving of being inducted into our Barclays WSL Hall of Fame.

"Not only was she an incredible player, but she is a wonderful ambassador for our game and has gone on to be a brilliant pundit. Congratulations on your induction, Karen."

Eni Aluko

Aluko's successes at both club and international level speak for them



selves, and she has been recognised for her achievements during a spell of over six years in the Barclays Women's Super League.

Aluko is also a fine example of an individual who took the dual career route during her playing days, earning a degree in Law while continuing to represent both club and country.

She began her career at Birmingham City before spells at Charlton Athletic and Chelsea. Like a number of England internationals, a stint in the United States followed just before the formation of the Barclays WSL, when she returned home in 2012 to play again for Birmingham City. It was here she won the Vitality Women's FA Cup following a penalty shootout win over Chelsea.

The most successful period in her career came when she moved to

Chelsea for her second spell at the club at the end of 2012. During this time, she won two Barclays WSL titles, two Vitality Women's FA Cups, and was awarded Chelsea's Player of the Year in 2015. Her form also saw her selected onto the PFA's Women's Super League Team of the Year in 2015 and 2017.

She departed the club in 2018 and left as the club's top scorer with 68 goals.

Playing over 100 times for her country in multiple World Cups and European Championships, the former Lioness finished her career at Juventus before announcing her retirement in January 2020. The next step in her career would see her move to the United States to take up a Sporting Director role with Angel City FC. Alongside this role, she has continued as a pundit on ITV and Amazon Prime, working on both the men's and women's game.

Jess Creighton, Broadcaster and Barclays WSL Hall of Fame panel member, said: "Eni Aluko is a thoroughly deserving Barclays WSL Hall of Fame inductee.

"As a player she set exceptionally high standards and was a key part of the growth in quality and popularity of the Barclays WSL. In a career full of goals and major trophies, Eni also broke down many barriers along the way.

"It's great to see her trailblazing contribution recognised as she continues to utilise her wealth of knowledge of the game as a broadcaster and administrator."

Katie Chapman

She becomes the seventh inductee into the prestigious Barclays WSL Hall of Fame since its launch last year and is the third player inducted this year with links to Chelsea.

Chapman's honours are almost unmatched, having played an integral role in central midfield for each team she represented during her career, including playing for Arsenal and Chelsea in the Barclays WSL. During her seven years in the league, she won four Barclays WSL titles, four Vitality Women's FA Cups (ten in total across her career) and three FA Women's Continental Tyres League Cups.

The midfield maestro began her career at Millwall in 1996, making her

debut as a 14-year-old, before spells at Fulham, Charlton Athletic and Arsenal. A stint in America would follow, before she returned to begin her Barclays WSL career back with the Gunners.



There, she won two league and cup trebles as the North London club dominated the early years of the semi-professional era of the game, winning the Barclays WSL, Vitality Women's FA Cup and FA Women's Continental Tyres League Cup.

In 2014, she moved to Chelsea, where she finished her career with another two league titles in 2015 and 2017/18, and two Vitality Women's FA Cups—the second being her last match as a professional in 2018.

Chapman announced her retirement from the game following the Vitality Women's FA Cup triumph, but has remained very much in the game, working as a pundit for BBC Sport's coverage of the Barclays WSL.

Vic Akers, former Arsenal Head Coach, and member of the Barclays Women's Super League Hall of Fame selection panel said: "I'm so pleased that Katie Chapman has been unveiled as the third inductee to the Barclays WSL Hall of Fame for 2022.

"I had the pleasure of working with her when she was at Arsenal and I truly believe she is one of our most underrated players. She could dominate a midfield and her leadership on and off the field was something to admire.

"Watching her as a player was an absolute pleasure and the influence she had on the players around her was remarkable. I'm over the moon that Katie has been recognised for her impact on the women's game and inducted into the Barclays Women's Super League Hall of Fame."

Denial of an Obvious Goalscoring Opportunity

My experience as a referee consistently shows me how much players do not know the laws of the game, or simply misunderstand them.

It is a frustrating aspect of refereeing that we so often judged by people who have never read IFAB's laws, and this particular law often generates the most assumptions, and the least amount of understanding.

A foul often occurs in the attacking phase, and a player will run up to me and claim, "That was last man/woman!" As if this automatically means it's a red card.

Cue their resistance when I say that last man/woman is not, in itself, a sending off offence.

The law this refers to is 'Denial of an Obvious Goalscoring Opportunity', or as its referred to among referees — a DOGSO. Whilst the number of defenders that are present is something a referee takes into account, 'last man/woman' does not always mean it's a DOGSO.

Of course, a law change that occurred a few years ago means that, should the offence take place inside the penalty area, a DOGSO is only a yellow card offence if the player made "an attempt to play the ball." For example, if the player mistimed a tackle and took the player by accident. Alternatively, if the player holds or pulls the player, this is not counted a genuine attempt to play the ball.

Outside of the penalty area, however, a DOGSO is always a sending off offence.

So what considerations are actually considered when deciding if it is a DOGSO?

The wording of the IFAB laws state that you must consider:

- Distance between the offence and the goal
- General direction of play
- Likelihood of keeping or gaining control of the ball
- Location and number of players

As a referee, you remember these as DDDC: Distance, Direction, Defenders, Control. Let's consider each:

Distance:

If the player is on the halfway line then this is a considerable distance from the goal, and is unlikely to be a DOGSO. If, however, the player in possession is a fast-paced attacker, and all defenders are ten yards back in their opposition's half, then a DOGSO would be more likely.

Direction:

Is the player in possession heading toward goal? If the player is travelling down the wing, and has quite a bit of work to do to be central enough for a decent shot, then being "last man/woman" might not be enough for a DOGSO.

Defenders:

Of course, whether there are any more defenders left between the attacker and the goal, is a consideration. As I've highlighted, however, it is one of four factors to consider.

Control:

How here is a key one. How in control of the ball is the player?

Many referees believe that the player's ability comes under this requirement.

For example, if Sam Kerr or Lionel Messi has the ball, they are far more likely to score than your average grassroots Sunday league player. They are likelier to be able to control a difficult ball and get it on target than an amateur in the local park. Therefore, if you see a player sent off for a DOGSO in the Women's Super League Premier League, that doesn't necessarily mean that the same situation would be a DOGSO in the league you play in.

So far this season, we have only had one DOGSO red card. This was seven minutes into Brighton's WSL opener against Arsenal, when Emma Kullberg was sent off. Blackstenius was through on goal and, at the edge of the area, Kullberg clipped her opposition's feet, taking her down.

In this situation:

Distance:

Blackstenius was at the edge of the penalty area, close enough to goal to keep running in for a better shot, or to have a decent shot from where she was.

Direction:

Blackstenius was running directly at the centre of the penalty area.

Defenders:

There were no other defenders that were in a position to prevent a shot or a run.

Control:

Blackstenius was in full control of the ball, and is a decent enough player to have had a decent shot.

The foul met all four requirements, meaning the referee was able to confidently show the red card.

So next time you run up to the referee saying, "That was the last man/woman!" – just remember; they have four things to consider, and your observation is NOT the deciding factor.



Beth Mead scoops second place at the Ballon d'Or awards

After a sensational summer with the Lionesses and a standout season with Arsenal, winger Beth Mead was voted for as the world's second-best player.

She came behind Barcelona and Spain midfielder Alexia Putellas.

Fellow Lioness Lucy Bronze placed 10th whilst club teammate Vivianne Miedema was ranked 11th.

Sam Kerr clinches third

Chelsea striker Sam Kerr clinched third place at the Ballon d'Or awards.

> Kerr was prolific for the London Blues last season, scoring 20 WSL goals in 20 appearances and she looks to be aiming for the same impact this time round.

Teammate Millie Bright also placed in the top twenty, ranking 15th.

Cissoko receives red card

Tensions boiled over when Aston Villa hosted West Ham earlier this month with the match ending with three red cards being shown in stoppage time.

West Ham defender Hawa Cissoko was involved in an altercation with Villa's Sarah Mayling that resulted in Cissoko using her hands to visibly hit

Mayling. Cissoko received a red card for her reaction and Mayling received a yellow for her part.

Daly scoops WSL award

Rachel Daly picked up the WSL's Player of the Month award beating out stiff competition from Beth Mead, Fran Kirby, Maya Le Tissier, Raffaele Souza and Katie Zelem.

Daly got off to a flying start with new club Aston Villa netting three goals in their first two games.

Carter signs new deal

Chelsea's versatile defender Jess Carter has signed a three year deal that will keep her with the London Blues until 2025.

On her new contract, the Lionesses star said, "I'm very excited and proud to extend my contract at Chelsea for three more years.

"I'm looking forward to continuing my development with the team, helping them to become even more successful."

Carla Ward picks up Manager of the Month

Double whammy for Aston Villa as Carla Ward picked up the award for Manager of the Month. Ward beat out Arsenal's Jonas Eidevall and Manchester United's Marc Skinner.

> At the time Ward's side had played two, won two and scored three.

EA Sports host Women's Football Summit

In the first of it's kind EA Sports presented a Women's Football Summit to celebrate the launch of the WSL in FIFA23.

A whole host of present and former WSL stars including pundits Fara Williams, Kelly Smith and Karen Carney as well as European Champion Rachel Daly and Chelsea sensation Lauren James walked the red carpet before Sam Kerr joined host Robin Chowdhury to talk about the development of the game.

Boye-Hlorkah suffers ACL injury

Aston Villa winger Chantelle Boye-Hlorkah ruptured her ACL during their Conti Cup tie with Everton.

Villa have confirmed that Boy-Hlorkah will begin a rehabilitation period immediately.

Arsenal break WSL record

The Gunners have set a new WSL record for the longest consecutive run of wins in the competition's history. Arsenal have now won their last 13 WSL games with the last one a 3-1 win over fellow London Club West Ham at Borehamwood.

Hope Powell steps down as Brighton manager

Brazil joins the Lilywhites list of stars who are recovering from torn ACL's as Ria Percival, Kyah Simon and Kit Graham are all still out.

Earps earns clean sheets

Manchester United goalkeeper has now earned five clean sheets in five games this season making her the only keeper who has not conceded so far.

Manchester United have enjoyed a flying start to the season winning all of their games and currently sit top of the table with 15 points and a goal difference of 14, one more than Arsenal.


A steps in with fines for Aston Villa and West Ham

Match Report: Arsenal vs West Ham

Arsenal set a new Women's Super League record of 13 successive wins when they came from behind to beat West Ham. Dagny Brynjarsdottir had given West Ham the lead in the first half, before Jordan Nobbs equalised for the home side two minutes after coming on for the injured Kim Little. Stina Blackstenius and Frida Maanum added goals for the Gunners during the second half to seal the victory.

Arsenal had slipped down to third in the league before the start of match after wins Manchester United and Chelsea earlier on Sunday and had to win by three goals to go back top. It was West Ham though who had the first chance of the match when Brynjarsdottir saw her header from a corner saved. West Ham defended well in the early stages, and they had another opportunity in the 20th minute but former Arsenal player Lisa Evans sent her shot wide.

Arsenal's first effort at goal came in the 23rd minute when Katie McCabe's fierce shot went wide. West Ham did have the ball in the net in the 27th minute but Brynjarsdottir's header was disallowed. Not sure for what reason though?! Caitlin Foord's shot from 25-yards was caught by Sophie Hillyerd, who was making her first start in goal for the Hammers.

Arsenal were causing some of their own problems when trying to play out from the back, and it was a defensive mistake that led to West Ham taking the lead in the 35th minute. Steph Catley's poor back-pass hit the post and Brynjarsdottir was first the rebound to score her fourth league goal of the season from close range. This ended Arsenal's record run of 10 consecutive WSL games without letting a goal in.

There was a bit of an edge to the game, and a good atmosphere

with a sold-out crowd of 3,988 at Meadow Park watching. Hillyerd made a good save to keep out a Beth Mead shot in the 38th minute. Five minutes before the break, Arsenal captain Little picked up an injury and had to be helped from the pitch then stretchered off.

Nobbs came onto to replace her and two minutes later scored Arsenal's equaliser. A corner was cleared only as far as the Gunners midfielder who smashed in a low shot from about 15-yards.

Arsenal had an opportunity to go in further ahead before half time but Foord saw her shot saved as the sides went in level. They had a good chance in the 52nd minute but Blackstenius' shot was pushed away by Hillyerd then Foord put the rebound into the side netting.

The home side did go ahead a minute later. Catley swung in a free-kick that Blackstenius volleyed into the net from 6-yards.

Honoka Hayashi shot over for West Ham in the 55th minute as they looked to quickly equalise. At the other end, Beth Mead sent a cross fizzing across the goal in the 65th minute which was put behind for a corner.

The Gunners extended their lead in the 70th minute. McCabe crossed and Maanum headed in at the far post to finish a move that she had started.

Hillyerd made a few more saves from Lina Hurtig and Jordan Nobbs on what was an impressive performance from the West Ham goalkeeper. Manuela Zinsberger made a good save of her own as the match entered additional time when she clawed away a shot from Brynjarsdottir. Arsenal had the final chance of the game when Hurtig's shot was saved then Maanum hit the post.



Jordan Nobbs:

The fans are the best part of football

Jordan Nobbs has quashed any doubts of her place in the Gunners squad in her last two appearances for the Arsenal, scoring in both with complete finesse and conviction.

The Arsenal and England midfielder spoke to the media after the Gunners 3-1 win over West Ham in the WSL on Sunday. Nobbs has won the Arsenal Women Supporter Club's player of the match in the last two matches and the crowd certainly seem to be on board with this.

Here is what she had to say....

How has it felt waiting for you chance this season?

"I don't know. Obviously I love this club so much and I've absolutely trained my bum off for the past five/six months. I think eventually just them little moments of things come, whether that's something happening and I've got to be ready but, I am a little bit proud of myself just staying in it. And what a set of girls we have. Like it is hard to get in to the team and I think that is what makes it so special when you

get chances on the pitch because you know you are playing up against a top, top talent."

How much inspiration have you drawn from other players (Lotte Wubben-Moy and Frida Maanum) that have had to wait to take their chance?

"I think it just shows what talent we have with some of the players. Frida came in and had a fantastic game against Lyon and obviously me and Frida were on the bench a lot. We kept pulling each other through when we are going out for training.

"Because sometimes you have to keep saying 'right we do the training again, we go again', and it brings the team together because at the end of the day we all have to play a part.



Bristol City lead the way

A third of the way into the current, Women's Championship campaign, and its Wiltshire side, Bristol City, leading the way after seven games.

Already boasting a five-point advantage on joint-second duo of London City Lionesses, and Southampton, the Robins are currently enjoying an unbeaten start, with six wins and a draw already under their belts.

In fact, the Robins also lead the way in both goals, and assists, the former seeing Shania Hayles with six goals, followed by Sarah Ewens (London) and Saffron Jordan (Blackburn) with five apiece, whilst the latter has Abi Harrison, alongside Katie Wilkinson (Southampton) and Bethan Roe (Charlton).

BRISTOL CITY

Top for the past five weeks, and with 'keeper Fran Bentley having kept five clean sheets during the opening phase of the season, the Robins also won their recent, Continental Cup opener with a convincing, 4-0 win, at home to Crystal Palace.

That arrived at the start of the month, at the Robins High Performance Centre as Olivia Clark was afforded her first start in goal by manager Lauren Smith as a first-half brace from Abi Harrison saw control asserted at the half; Chloe Mustaki was seen to add a third late in the game before a spectacular fourth was added at the death when Emily Syme hit a first-time strike, from fully 25 yards.

October would also see the Robins put three past both Sheffield United and Crystal Palace, and two past Charlton Athletic, the latter they'll face late November in their next, Continental Cup outing; the Robins will be, without question, looking to extend that advantage at the top as they aim to win their first piece of major silverware.

LONDON CITY

Having lost their season opener, the capitals Lionesses are unbeaten in their last six outings in the league, winning four and drawing two, whilst also enjoying a 2-2 draw with WSL side, West Ham United, in their opening game of the Conti Cup.

As with the leaders, the Lionesses have also kept five clean sheets thus far, one of which arrived in the convincing, 5-0 win, away to bottom club Coventry United as Sarah Ewens bagged a hat-trick alongside further efforts from Atlanta Primus

and Grace Neville, the five coming within fifty-two minutes.

With the win over Coventry, it would mark a fiftieth appearance for the club for Primus, the Jamaican having joined the club in September 2020, and saying after the win, and goal, against the divisions' bottom blub that: "(I'm) delighted to make my 50th appearance for the club and to top it off with a goal and three points makes it even more special.

"A lot of hard work has got me to this point and I'm grateful for those who have supported me throughout this journey so far!"

Late November meanwhile will see them host Brighton & Hove Albion in their next match in the Conti Cup, whilst looking to make inroads on that lead put together by the frontrunners.

SOUTHAMPTON

The Saints, joint-second, have had a similar start to the Lionesses, losing their first outing before winning four and drawing two of the next six outings, although they'll have been somewhat despondent having crashed to a 2-0 defeat away to Coventry in the Conti Cup.

They did follow that with three, consecutive, 1-0 wins, although they'll be wanting much more, especially if they're too put together a serious title challenge, Ella Pusey, a product of Hampshire's FA Centre of Excellence, having scored two of those three.

Now, with just a few games in November, the Saints will be clamouring for maximum points in the league, as well as getting something from their Conti Cup clash at home to WSL side, Reading, at the end of it.

CRYSTAL PALACE

There's been a mixed start for the Eagles, winning four and losing three of their seven outings to date, two of those losses coming in the last three outings, as well as the earlier defeat in Bristol in the Conti Cup.

In fact, Bristol have beaten the crest-fallen Eagles twice in October, following up the 4-0 cup trouncing, with a 3-0 score in the league, it was a bad month indeed, one which, having conceded nine without netting, somehow edged a win in the north-east, when at Durham, on 30 October.

That three points alone was against the odds, the hosts having had more possession, corners, free kicks, shots etc, compared to the London-based side, however, Anna Filbey's goal, on the half-volley, just before the interval, and a Fran Kitching penalty save, was enough to get the points.

With only two pints splitting them, and London rivals Charlton, November's clash, at Hayes Lane, could prove pivotal. (NEXT MONTH WILL SEE AN INTERVIEW WITH PALACE MIDFIELDER, LEIGH NICOL).

CHARLTON ATHLETIC

The Addicks have not won in their last three outings in the league, whilst also falling to Lewes in the Conti Cup, the highlight being a 2-2 draw at home to Blackburn mid-month thanks to second half goals from Emily Simpkins (penalty) and Melissa Johnson, this after they'd gone two down inside the opening twenty-five minutes.

Defeat at home to Bristol, in their last outing, did however provide hope for the Addicks boss, Karen Hills, she saying afterwards that: "I thought they were a very good side and probably deserved it more than us today because I thought they were better in the areas that we need to be better in," and ahead to the match against Durham: "It's going to be a long trip, but the group needs to stick together.

"We're going to work hard as what we did last week if not more. We're a team and we win, we lose, and we draw together."

But then, having lost to Bristol in the league, the Addicks also have the Robins in the Conti Cup at the end of November, a tough outing.

BIRMINGHAM CITY

The mid-table Blues are as close to the top as they are to the bottom of the Championship, although they've played a game less than the rest.

Their Conti Cup clash, at the start of month, was an exciting win for the West Midlands hosts, when hosting WSL side, Brighton; Libby Smith afforded the Championship side an interval lead, netting midway through the first.

Jade Pennock, who set up Smith for the opener, added the second, before the visitors pulled a goal back through Lee Geum-Min; minutes later, the hosts' two-goal advantage was restored when Lucy Quinn netted just after the hour mark, again set-up by Pennock, with Danielle Carter getting the Seagulls' second late on.

The Blues' November though, it'll see them on the road for their three matches, at top two sides, London and Bristol, in the league, then away to West Ham in the Conti Cup.

LEWES

Having won their last two league games, and defeated visitors Charlton in the Conti Cup, the Rooks have enjoyed a rich vein of form of late, especially having drawn their opening four matches of the season.

Scott Booth's side, although losing to Durham, followed up their Conti Cup victory with victories over Charlton, again, in the league, and away to Coventry, albeit narrowly in both; Ellie Hack and Paula Howells netted in the former, whilst Emily Kraft netted the only goal of the game in the latter.

Howells' strike against Charlton, seeing her strike go in off the crossbar, ruled out more spectacular goals, although she may need to shake her memory up somewhat, saying after that victory: "I can't even remember it! I'll need to watch it back

"All I know is it was my right foot and that very rarely happens. I'm delighted with it though. I thought I was a tap-in player these days but obviously I'm not done with the worldies!"

BLACKBURN ROVERS

The Lancashire side are presently fifth bottom in the Championship having won just two of their seven games this season, although they unbeaten in their last three outings; the Conti Cup meanwhile, that's a different story after they were swept aside by both Leicester City, and Manchester City, the latter taking a 6-o result.

A 2-2 draw away to Charlton, goals coming from Millie Chandarana and Saffron Jordan, was followed up by a 3-2 win at home to Coventry, Farah Crompton's brace helping the hosts to three points, after Jordan's early opener, in mid-October.

Away to London City, at the end of the month, Blackburn would hold the high-fliers to a tough, goalless draw, affording hope of a turn in fortunes, with games against Sunderland and Southampton to come in the league, before a trip to Merseyside, and Liverpool Women, in the Conti Cup.

SHEFFIELD UNITED

Following a little, upwards spurt, the Blades have been on a downward spiral of late, and are currently on a four match, winless streak (five in all competitions), including losing their last three, which has seen them plummet to fourth bottom.

A 3-3 draw, at the start of October, when away to Durham, in the Conti Cup, afforded signs of what the Blades are capable of, Georgia Walters netting in her first start for the club, she adding a second after the restart, heading home a cross from Bex Rayner.

It would be midfielder, Rayner, who added the hosts' third, on the half-volley, with ten minutes remaining; that result, the euphoria, was quickly deflated in the ensuing

outings however, the Blades falling to defeats, in the league, against Bristol, Southampton, and Birmingham.

The remainder of 2022 is pivotal to both their Championship survival, and any luck in the Conti Cup, where they have Everton (h), Aston Villa (h), and Manchester United (a), to play.

DURHAM

Speaking of the Red Devils, didn't Durham do well against their WSL opponents in the Conti Cup, and this despite erratic league form.

Third bottom in the Championship, albeit with a game following the postponement of the game with Birmingham, the north-east side are in a sequence of win one, lose one, but, it's in the Conti Cup that success is being witnessed.

At the start of October Durham, having drawn 3-3 with Championship rivals, Sheff. United, won 5-3 on penalties, Beth Hepple netting two and Rio Hardy the other; meanwhile,

at the end of the month, goals from Jess Clarke and Sarah Robson gained a 2-2 draw against the WSL side.

Twice coming from behind, Durham's second, via Robson, arrived deep into stoppage time, before winning on penalties, in front of a sell-out crowd at Maiden Castle – the winning spot-kick coming from Bridget Galloway, whilst home 'keeper, Naoisha McAloon, saved two in the shoot-out.

Durham have a great chance in November to pick up points, in both competitions, with games against Charlton and Coventry to come in the league, alongside a trip to Aston Villa in the Conti Cup.

SUNDERLAND

The second-bottom Black Cats are enduring a tough season to date, winning just one of their seven games, claiming a 2-0 success at fourth-top Crystal Palace, goals coming from Emily Scarr and Katy Watson.

That victory arrived after the Black Cats narrowly fell to a lone-goal defeat to visitors Liverpool, in the Conti Cup; recent exploits though have come at a cost, 24-year-old defender Faye Mullen suffering an ACL (anterior cruciate ligament) injury, which has since ruled her out for the remainder of the season.

COVENTRY UNITED

It's a tough season for the Warwickshire club, bottom of the table, zero points, seven straight losses in the league, including an 8-0 defeat to the Blades and a 5-0 reverse against the Lionesses, damage limitation quickly springs to mind.

November's games having already begun, it's set to be a bust month for those in the Championship, with both league, and Conti Cup outings aplenty, alongside those often, international call-ups of which there's been several.



Bristol City us Crystal Palace



Bristol City continued their undefeated start to the season when they beat Crystal Palace 3-0 at the Robins High Performance Centre.

After having two goals disallowed during the first half, Shania Hayles gave the home side the lead in the 41st minute. Emily Syme scored their second in the 48th minute, and Abi Harrison added the third four minutes later. Ffion Morgan saw her shot hit the crossbar later in the second half for The Robins as they had chances to win by more.

Having beaten Palace 4-0 in the Conti Cup recently, Bristol City had the first chance in this game withing the first 30 seconds of the start when Ffion Morgan was just unable to get onto Harrison's cross across goal. The home side did have the ball in the net in the 14th minute but Harrison's effort was ruled out for offside. Crystal Palace had their first opportunity a minute later when Blanchard cut in but sent her effort well over.

Harrison was unable to convert a cross in the 18th minute, and Fran Kitching made a fantastic save from close-range to deny Morgan five minutes later. In the 24th minute, Syme saw her header deflected wide. Palace were having the occasional chance and in the 26th minute a dangerous cross from Blanchard was cleared.

Kitching made another good save in the 28th minute from Morgan, and Bristol City found the net again three minutes later but it was disallowed after referee Amy Fearn spotted an offence from a corner. In the 40th minute, Elise Hughes was just unable to get her head on a Fliss Gibbons cross for the away side.

The home side took the lead four minutes before half time. Kitching got her hands on Hayles' low shot but was unable to stop the ball from crossing the line.

Anna Filbey made a superb clearance off the line a minute later to deny Harrison. Palace broke down the other end which ended with Chloe Arthur putting the chance over. The Robins had a barrage of chances just before the break but were denied by saves from Kitching and blocks by Palace players.

The rain that had started during the first half had got heavier after half time. Three minutes into the second half and the hosts made it 2-0 when Syme's first time strike from the edge of the area found the corner of the net.

Bristol City made it 3-0 in the 52nd minute. Morgan put a cross in which was headed in at the far post by Harrison.

Hayles had a good chance to score City's fourth in the 56th minute but shot wide when one on one with the goalkeeper. A minute later and Morgan saw her strike from 25-yards hit the crossbar and bounce away. Aimee Palmer then put a free kick from 35-yards out over. On the hour mark, Harrison was unable to get a touch on Morgan's low cross across goal.

The visitors did have the odd chance but Paige Bailey-Gayle couldn't get past Bristol City goalkeeper Fran Bentley, and Gibbons was stopped by a good tackle after running through.

Harrison saw her shot from 12-yards saved in the 79th minute, and Jodie Hutton's dipping effort went over two minutes later for the hosts. Kitching made another save to deny Morgan in the 82nd minute. Morgan had another effort from close range saved five minutes later. Palace had the final chance of the match but Hughes put her effort wide.

The study, led by academics from Staffordshire University, involved more than 1,100 players, coaches and managers from grassroots to elite level clubs in Bulgaria, England, Finland, France, Poland and Spain.

Dr Jacky Forsyth, Associate Professor of Exercise Physiology, explained: "The topic of ovarian hormones and their effects on training and performance, in addition to pregnancy and postpartum, seems to have received scant consideration.

"In sport, these topics also come with varying degrees of stigma and silence, as well as being a barrier to gender equality.

"Despite some good practices in individual clubs across different countries, there was limited knowledge and understanding of how training, performance and health are affected. Knowledge was generally left up to the individual without support from governing bodies or coach education providers."

69% of all participants said that educational provision on menstrual cycle was 'not at all' provided at their clubs and while some clubs tracked players' menstrual cycle this was varied and inconsistent.

Approaching coaches about menstrual cycle was identified as difficult for some players with one barrier being that 'the female game is still predominantly coached by males' and that 'males won't understand'. Because of this, some players supported each other, keeping it 'between us girls' rather than approaching their coaches.

Similarly, 77% of respondents reported no educational provision on hormonal contraception and 64% reported no educational provision on pregnancy. Furthermore, only 5% knew of club policies on pregnancy, maternity leave, motherhood and caring responsibilities/childcare.

Co-author Dr Alex Blackett said: "These findings shine a light on the fact that football training and education is still geared towards the men's games. The development of women's football seems to be surface level at the moment and underneath it all there's still a lot more that needs to be done."

The team at Staffordshire University will now work directly with football clubs in the UK to put some of their findings into practice and E-WinS project partners are producing toolkits which will be freely available online.

In 2022, Chelsea F.C. Women became the first football club in the world to tailor training to players' menstrual cycles and the England women's manager Sarina Wiegman introduced menstrual tracking apps ahead of the team's victory at the 2022 European Women's Football Championship.

More recently, a number of teams announced a switch to coloured shorts with their home kit because of player concerns about wearing white during their periods.

Dr Forsyth added: "Something as simple as tracking players' menstrual cycles can make a huge difference. For instance, performance may be optimised at certain phases of the menstrual cycle and training could be adapted in order to avoid injury and muscle soreness.

"Coaches should be knowledgeable about issues that are specific to women and my hope is this will be incorporated into the FA's coaching awards because it is clearly needed."

Menstrual cycle, hormonal contraception and pregnancy in women's football: perceptions of players, coaches and managers is published in the Sport in Society journal.

Gillingham Women announce take-over



Gillingham Women have announced that they have a new chairman and owner.

The future of the club was in the balance on the eve of the season, with with owner and chairman Josh Oatham stating in August he feared "for the club's existence" if a new buyer wasn't found.

After a two month process, it has been announced that business manager Kevin Hake will be the new owner and chairman.

Hake is already the manager-chairman of Chatham Town men's team.

It means they will now also play their home games at Chatham's Bauvill Stadium as Hake takes the reins from Oatham who had been in sole charge for the past two years after Gillingham Football Club's decision to no longer fund the women's section. Oatham will, however, continue to manage Gillingham Women's first-team.

They sit seventh in the Southern Premier League.

All Chatham Town season ticket holders will get free entry to Gillingham Women fixtures at the Bauvill Stadium.

Hake wrote in a a statement: "I couldn't sit back and allow Kent's highest-placed women's team that sits in the third tier of English football struggle.

"With the success of the Lionesses' in the summer, and seeing how this galvanised a community spirit, this resonated with me. I'm excited to have the opportunity to become the club's new chairman and can't wait to get started.

"What Josh has achieved with, not only this club, but also for wider female football participation in Kent, is nothing short of fantastic and epitomises everything I strive for. I thank him for everything and he will always be a big part of this club.

"As a show of my appreciation, I'm delighted that he's accepted the invitation to become our club president.

"I'm thrilled to announce that, after a series of talks with Josh, he's also agreed to remain in charge as manager of the first-team. This will provide a fabulous platform for stability and continuity as we look to continue building on the team's successes over the recent seasons.

"I would like to extend a warm welcome to Gillingham Women FC's players, volunteers and supporters who can rest easy in the knowledge that their club is in safe hands. The club will continue to compete at the highest level and use the Bauvill Stadium as their new home.

"I'm keen on inclusivity and this will allow the local community to watch Gillingham Women FC in Chatham. I'll be embarking on some exciting community initiatives that will encourage everyone to support Josh and our fantastic group of players.

"Now's the time to get behind your local team and get to know the players! Further details will be released across a variety of social media platforms in the forthcoming days."

Oatham added: "On a personal note, I am really proud of the incredible journey we have been on together during my time as Chairman. I would like to thank everyone, players, staff, volunteers and sponsors, past and present, who have helped to ensure that this club remained in existence and went on to achieve one of our best ever seasons in teh FA Women's National League Southern Premier Division. This club will forever have a special place in my heart."

Laura Walker has been playing football for as long as she can remember, it's inargined in every part of her

Laura Walker has been playing football for as long as she can remember, it's ingrained in every part of her life. Whether it is playing for Chorley Women or as a Sports Lecturer at Salford City College, she is usually found with a football or talking about it.

Simon O'Neill sat down and chatted to her about her career so far.

At what age were you first interested in football?

I've been interested in football as long as I can remember. I found a picture at my parents house not too long ago with a ball at my feet when I was about one so I guess it started pretty early.

Who were your football idols as when young The exposure to women's football was I was kid just wasn't there so my role models growing up were all men. David Beckham and Zinedine Zidane were the main two players I looked at as to how they played the game.

How did you find your preferred position? I have evolved as a footballer over the years, I used to be a winger in my youth but then moved to the middle of the pitch when I was about 27. It allowed me to get on the ball more and I was fortunate that I had a coach that saw potential for me in a different position and wasn't afraid to take a risk on me to let me develop over a few seasons in a new role.

As you progressed through your age groups in football, when did you realise that you had the talent to play in a high level? I guess when I started to be selected to play for clubs and then colleges and Universities at a higher level I realised that i had talent and potential, but it just seemed all part of the natural process of progression so It didn't seem like a big deal or anything to shout about at the time.

Has your role as a sports lecturer helped you in your football career?

Without doubt, staying up to date with what is current in our sport has been helpful, with regards to things like how my body responds to exercise, sports nutrition and injury treatment methods for example. But for me its to understand how younger people work, how I as a senior player can help them and I see things my students go through and the experiences they have had in sport so far, and I look to implement anything that I think will benefit our younger players at the club

Do your current students know you are a football player at a high level? Yes, they do, they ask me every Monday morning how my match went the day before, they can usual tell as soon as they walk in by the look on my face! It's nice that they take an interest, as I do in their sporting achievements outside of college.

With teaching being such a busy schedule, how do you fit in the training at Chorley? We train twice a week, on what are also my busiest teaching days. Sometimes I get to nip home for 30mins in-between work and training, other times I have to go straight from work. Its tough but I know what I signed up for and I love training, so I won't complain. I take two meals with me to work on a Tuesday and Thursday to make sure I am fuelled for training and don't have a mid session crash!

What are the training sessions like at Chorley (without giving away any secrets)? Training is great. With regards to organisation and planning, its some of the best I've had. Each session has a purpose, each session is geared towards the upcoming game on a Sunday and is usually at a good tempo, players are expected to work hard but also do that with a smile on their face.

Are there any ambitions to play in the WSL and do you think Chorley are capable of reaching this level?

For me, no, I am at the wrong end of the career timeline for any ambitions to play in the WSL. As for the club, it would be an amazing achievement for my club to get there, but to be honest, without some major investment, that is a pipe dream. You have to have so much money and backing to even make the step up to the next level, infrastructure has to be in place that doesn't even exist in our local area so there would have to be some major changes regardless of how well we would perform on the pitch.

If you can offer girls any advice on football what would it be?

Work hard in training, work hard outside of training, believe in your own ability, listen to your coaches and be thankful for the opportunity to play as its not always been there for girls and women.

Four teams remain unbeaten

At the time of writing, just four teams - Burnley, Oxford United, Hashtag United and Cardiff City - were still unbeaten in League games.

Burnley lie third in the Northern Premier Division with 22 points from ten games, but four draws are significant in the fact they trail leaders Wolverhampton Wanderers by three points. Burnley won 3-1 at Wolves and drew 1-1 at home to second place Nottingham Forest, but both the top duo have dropped points in just one other game. Millie Ravening and Evie Priestley account for the vast majority of Burnley's goals.

Oxford United went top of the Southern Premier Division, forging a two point lead over Watford and Portsmouth. Oxford have been involved in three 1-1 scorelines, including their clash with Watford, while they won their other six games without conceding a goal, including a 2-0 home success over Portsmouth.

Hashtag United top Division One South East with 19 points from seven games, three points ahead of second place Norwich City. Hashtag are clear top scorers with 31 goals, a 13-2 home victory over Chesham being a significant factor.

Eight different players netted for Hashtag that day with Brooke Cairns scoring four times. With 11 different players finding the back of the net and Cairns the top scorer with just five, Hashtag have not been reliant on just one or two players for goals.

Cardiff City, with seven wins from seven, are the only team with a 100% record in the FAWNL. They top Division One South East by two points from Exeter City whom they have already beaten handsomely (5-0). Cardiff's 39 goals for is only matched by Stourbridge, while they boast the joint best defensive record with just two goals conceded (AFC Wimbledon the other team).

Cori Williams has scored eight goals with both Chloe Lloyd and Ellie Sergeant just one behind. At the opposite end of the table, Larkhall Athletic gained their first points with a 4-1 home victory over AFC St Austell who remain bottom on zero points along with Maidenhead United.

Experience proves important

While the English Lionesses have been at the forefront of a campaign to ensure one legacy of their Euros triumph was for all girls to be able to access playing football at school, it is refreshing to note that two players with a wealth of experience are still going strong in the FAWNL. Both play for teams battling it out at the top end of the Southern Premier Division.

Helen Ward is in her second spell with Watford and has a wealth of WSL experience as well as over 100 caps for Wales. Meanwhile, Oxford United's Shelley Provan (nee Cox) made her debut for Southampton before the turn of the last century and after playing for several clubs in the FAWNL as well as a brief spell with Doncaster Rovers in the WSL, helped Southampton FC Women to last season's Southern Premier Division title.

New records set in East Midlands derby

The Nottingham Forest v Derby County fixture on Sunday October 16 set a new FAWNL Northern Premier Division attendance record with 5,082 at The City Ground to witness a 2-0 home win. Both last season's fixtures between the pair were played at the men's stadia with 4,443 at Forest and 3,552 at County.

Sophie Domingo, a Derby player last season, became the latest to feature for both the East Midlands teams. Notable names to have done so previously include Ellie Gilliatt, Precious Hamilton and Kelly Kennaugh (nee Finley). Gilliatt an dHamilton are no longer at Derby and combined with Domingo, that trio accounted for 28 of Derby's 48 League goals as they finished runners up.

Late Barker goal secures victory

Just how important Katie Barker's stoppage time winner for Newcastle United at home to Barnsley will prove at the end of the season remains to be seen.

Barnsley goalkeeper Serena "Bean" Clarke almost ensured a vital point for the visitors who are much improved this term after spending too much of last season in the relegation zone.

Newcastle's win put them second in the table, behind Leeds United on goal difference with the pair on 16 points from 8 games. Both Durham Cestria (14 points) and Barnsley (13 points) have a game in hand.

Potentially, this promises to be the most closely fought title race in the six divisions. Durham won 2-1 at home Newcastle who have beaten Barnsley, themselves 2-0 home winners over Leeds who were unable to complete the quartet of home rule when they hosted Durham on November 6, losing 1-0.

Wymondham Town forced to withdraw

After struggling to raise a squad following an exodus of last season's squad (including some to neighbouring Norwich City) Wymondham United eventually got their season up and running, but sadly after playing a few games, they had to reluctantly call it a day.

The FAWNL suffered its first casualty of the season when Wymondham Town had to unfortunately withdraw from Division One South East. Having lost all four games (with a 23-1 goals deficit) and struggling to raise a team following promotion from the Eastern Regional League, it was a decision which was reluctantly taken, but the club will continue.

With the current economic situation being far from favourable, one has to wonder if Wymondham (a dozen miles south west of Norwich) will be the only casualty, or will others follow? At the end of October, with teams having played approximately one third of their fixtures, four FAWNL teams had yet to gain a point. Hounslow (also Division One South East) and the Division One South West trio of AFC St Austell, Larkhall Athletic and Maidenhead United. Losing week in week out and having players become disillusioned and leaving has proved a Catch-22 situation for teams at various levels over the years.

Stourbridge impressing

After losing 2-0 at Sheffield on their FAWNL debut, Stourbridge then reeled off eight successive wins to put themselves nine points clear at the top of the Division One Midlands table for what is the most impressive introduction since the re-structuring of the League to embrace the former Combination Leagues.

That run included a 10-1 home win over Long Eaton United whose goal by Ella Brennan was the first by a visiting player in over a year. In a re-arranged game against Sheffield, the visitors went ahead, Stourbridge levelled, but then an injury to Zoe Clarke who landed on her head caused the game to be abandoned.

Fortunately the ambulance arrived within half an hour and Clarke's injury was not as bad as first feared. Footballing injuries are not always so quickly attended to and there was a reported wait of several hours for an ambulance to arrive earlier this season.

Long Eaton struggling

For Long Eaton, fourth last term, this season is proving a nightmare.

Apart from a 2-1 home win over Leafield Athletic, they conceded at least five in each of their other seven League games and after eight games had 53 goals in their goals against column, almost double last season's tally of 27 for 22 league games.

Hear them roar:

Pride at preparing future footballing Lionesses



Some of the Future Lionesses may now come from Northamptonshire thanks to the FA's new, county-wide development programme for Elite female footballers and a successful 3 year license to run an ETC in the County.

The FA Emerging Talent Centre's (ETC) were launched in July, with the aim to increase the number of young female players engaged in Football Association programmes across England by the end of the 2023-24 season.

Northamptonshire's ETC is hosted by Northampton Town FC Community Trust in partnership with University of Northampton (UON) and supported by the Northamptonshire Football Association.

Female ETC players from across the County, will have access to the same top-level support and development opportunities as their male peers.

This will cover everything they need to help support them to reach their full potential in the game, with access to quality and experienced Northampton Town FC Community Trust coaches, state-of-the-art training facilities and the chance to learn and develop in the ETC programme in addition to playing grass roots football.

They will also have professional advice, testing and training at the University's Waterside campus, thanks to the partnership between the skilled University staff and will be developed on the pitch thanks the coaching programme set out by the NTFC Community Trust coaching staff.

Thanks to the holistic approach to the player development encouraged by the ETC programme players will also be educated and supported off the pitch. Informed by up-to-the-minute, research and led by members of the UON Sports Science team, this will include sessions on sport psychology to help players develop resilience and deal with performing under pressure.

There will also be top tips about good nutrition, both for the player's and their parents and guardians to foster greater understanding about the importance of good food.

Each ETC member will also have access to strength, conditioning and performance testing, pitch side injury support, and even the opportunity to receive further injury rehabilitation support in the University's Sports Rehabilitation and Conditioning Clinic at Waterside, with injury advice and treatment plans.

The first group of players have been recruited through a trial period. Last week they were officially welcomed with their families to an induction event at UON's Waterside campus, with talks about the programme and a tour of the UON facilities they'll have access to.

Scott Bradley, Subject Lead for Science at University of Northampton, was on-hand to talk about the sport psychology side of UON support. He said: "The Lionesses' triumph at the Women's Euro's this summer focused international attention on female football at a time when women's sporting excellence is very much the norm rather than the exception.

"Now, the need is to ensure future generations of women's football are supported from the grass roots up. The FA's Emerging Talent Centre programme looks set to do just this, and we are very proud about our part in helping support the development of these budding Lionesses."

Charlene Ward-Greef (Women & Girls Development Officer) from Northampton Town Football Club's Community Trust, added: "We are so proud of the development of female football at NTFC CT. We have more female footballers attending sessions and programmes across the trust and this has no doubt been inspired by not only the lionesses on a national level but also the Northampton Town FC Women.

"We aim to provide a place in football for females of all abilities across Northamptonshire, we are excited to be a vital part of the FA's Talent Pathway with the ETC here in Northampton."

Leigh Gill: I want every girl to have the chance to try football

Manchester were at the heart of the European Championships with the opening game at Old Trafford and then games held at the Manchester City Academy Stadium and Manchester Football Association is not going to miss the opportunity to make a difference for women's and girls' football in the area.

The European Championships 2022 legacy is well underway with targets already being smashed but instead of saying that will do, the team at the local FA are adding new legacies to their plan.

We sat down with Leigh Gell, Women's Football Recreation Officer to find out what they have been doing since the tournament.

Firstly, if you could please introduce yourself and give us a bit of information about what your role entails.

My name is Leigh, I work at Manchester FA. I look after all women's and girls' football that falls under our boundaries. Predominantly that is mainly playing opportunities but it is also things like workforce opportunities such as coaching refereeing, volunteering in the game.

There is a lot of talk about the legacy of the Euros, what are Manchester FA doing to help promote the legacy?

We had a legacy plan which started two years prior to the tournament starting. We have been looking at the progress of the plan. There were five key areas of the game from school, college, university levels but also looking at recreational football.

We saw a big gap in the women's and girls landscape in recreational opportunities to play football. Women could go and play in formalised Sunday leagues playing eleven aside but a lot of these women are part of the missed generation, they weren't able to play football at school. We

wanted to correct that wrong and allow them to play for fun in a safe environment.

We created a recreational league which now has over 500 people playing in Greater Manchester.

We also wanted to target traditionally under-represented communities and show them they can play football.

In the schools the pre-legacy plan we had the opportunity to go until 2024 for our targets but we have now reworked the plan to go to 2025.

We reached our female participation figure by 2024 already but we did not look at that and think 'job done' we wanted to push that even further. We want to grow it even further.

Looking at schools, have you been finding that there are more girls' teams than previously?

I think the big thing is that more girls see football and they know that they can play football. Some of this is about the girls stepping up and asking teachers if they can play. It's simple to do but it's a lot for a young girl to stand up and say that.

We have more and more girls that are playing outside of school, they will then go into school and the boys take over the lunch time pitch.

The girls are now saying that they want it to. Part of that comes from the tournament. If they didn't see the Lionesses in the spotlight as they were, they wouldn't have seen this. There is also a lot more teachers reaching out to us and the FA to see how they can create opportunities for the girls.

The FA have recently set up a tool to help teachers set up sessions for girls. It's about linking the school teams up to clubs and getting them that pathway to be able to play.

What do you think is the biggest challenge for your role at the moment?

For us the challenge is about facilities. We are not blessed with the weather so grass pitches don't work all-year-round. We do see games getting called off especially in December and January.

Some of our teams and clubs want to grow even further but they don't have the capacity or space to do that right now.

Previously a lot of that has been on workforce but what has been really nice is that because of the work we invested during the legacy, that is not as big of an issue as it was previously.

We had a Snickers bursary programme where we awarded 22 coaches qualifications. They are now actively coaching in the community.

We also run a young female coaching development training programme. We had 10 on the





The programme last season and we have 25 this season.

For the first time it feels like coaches is not the number one barrier for setting up new teams.

It now falls on facilities.

There is a considerable amount of money going into facilities development. The sad thing is that you cannot just build a 3G overnight. It does take time and it is very expensive. There is a long term commitment there.

The football foundation has also put in a fact that with new 3G pitches there has to be a percentage that is open to women and girls. I think this tries to protect those historical clubs who have long-standing agreements with schools and providers. They essentially have block bookings which prevent anyone else getting on the pitch.

The more that we see older, historical clubs opening up to women's football, they might have sites which creates more space.

Do you find that there is still a difficulty for women's and girls teams to be able to get access to pitches at premium times?

It is still an issue. With the newer facilities that have that 3G agreement in place, they have to provide it. I also think it is a problem across the whole of the grassroots game. They can't access the pitches, because other clubs have the connections.

I also think there are a lot of school sites that have 3Gs but they are not open to the communities. That is more what the local FA's and governments are trying to work on. We want to open these sites up. We mapped out 3Gs we have, we could cater to the demand we have but it is just a case of unlocking them.

We need to look how we can work with schools to see how we can get the local communities to be able to play on those sites and I think it all ties together. The more girls are wanting to play in school, the more the headteachers will see that opening the pitches to the community will also benefit their students so I hope it will work.

On a personal level, you play football as well. Have you seen a difference in your team and interest in the club?

I play for Bury which is Tier 6. We are relatively new club. I feel really valued at the club. We are on the same board as the men's team and a lot of the men's fans come and watch that.

I never thought that I would have people who have no direct relationship with the players, coming to watch and support. We are fortunate enough to be given tickets to watch the men, so we go and support them and they come and support us. When we go to the games, the fans know who we are and it is something I never expected.

It really feels like a community, it does not feel like there are two separate teams.

I have had so many emails from women and parents asking where I can play football. I love emails like that. The football world can be a glass bubble, there are so many opportunities when you get in but if you don't know about the local FA or what opportunities there are and where to find them, then you won't know they are there. I love showing people that they can be part of the game too.

Just from results that have been published so far, there has been obvious increases in attendance at WSL games, record sales at England games and then there is a massive increase in the opposite end of the scale at grassroots. Do you think it will work all the way through the pyramid? The National League is sat in the middle of the big plan but are they going to get the benefit of

what they need to keep going?

I think the FA's development plan of professionalising the National League and the work which is going into that, it will trickle down.

We are seeing huge attendances at WSL games. To see sell-outs at grounds that have always been easy to get to before, now we are actually having to plan in advance to go to games.

The great thing about the Championship and the National League is that it is really low cost. We at Manchester FA, do not have a National League club right now. We are hoping one of the teams get promoted this season. We have a team that were recently relegated.

More people are going to watch these games, people love watching football. It's a great atmosphere and I do believe it will go down to the National League.

What would be the biggest thing you want to achieve by the end of the legacy programme in 2025?

Through a big picture, I would love to see football on the curriculum at schools for girls. I want to see that every girl has the opportunity to try football. I love football. I don't expect every girl to love it but just to have the opportunity to play and try it in school and then they know whether they like it or not.

I would also love for teachers to be able to know where to direct children to where they can play outside. That's what I would like it to look like by 2025.

I started playing by accident but how good would it be if children are given the opportunity to try not just football but any sport and they can find their passion and their love.

Every girl should find a sport they love, there are so many out there to chose from.



The FA marks one year of its 'Football Your Way' plan



The Football Association [The FA] has marked the first anniversary of its Football Your Way plan by hosting a multi-team camp today, Friday 14th October, at St. George's Park with England players from across the Senior Men's Deaf, Partially Sighted and Cerebral Palsy squads, and the Senior Women's Deaf team.

Launched in October 2021, the landmark disability Football Your Way plan heralded an increased commitment from The FA with ambitions set to raise the profile of disability football and change the perceptions and social barriers to support more disabled people to play football by 2024.

In line with the goal of providing world-class coaching and support services for England para teams, St George's Park hosted over 20 England senior para camps throughout the 2021/22 season. The home of England football also proudly supported the formation of the new England Women's Blind team in May 2022, which saw the number of national para teams increased to seven with more to follow.

Activity at an elite level is mirrored with more provisions at a grassroots level, to drive an increase in the number of disabled people taking part in football across schools, clubs and the community for fun or competition.

The plan aims to increase participation by 50% by June 2024, by offering 2,800 opportunities to play for disabled people of all ages across all disability football formats. The figures are currently on track with 2,107 opportunities, a 13% increase on our baseline of 1,859.

Work is also being undertaken on the re-vamp of the Coaching Disabled Footballers learning offer and we will support the launch of the new e-module and Face to Face Continuing Professional Development module next year. Throughout the club network, a new toolkit and training workshop is being designed to support England Football Accredited Clubs to become more inclusive of disabled people on and off the field.

Research has also been carried out to identify how best to further embed disability provisions across existing community programmes including Weetabix Wildcats for 5 to 11-year-old girls and Snickers Protein Just Play which provides sessions for and females aged 16-year-olds and upwards.

Across inclusion school networks new schemes have

been piloted, with the introduction of **Special** a Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) Disney Inspired Shooting Stars club resource which aims to engage disabled children extra-curricular activity along with a SEND Disney Inspired Stars Shooting **Festival** resource designed to encourage a positive introduction competition for disabled children in schools.

Additionally, the new Project B1 initiative was piloted, a beginner friendly version of blind football to help secondary schools engage more visually impaired and blind young people in football and enable them to have a positive experience of competition.

Baroness Sue Campbell, The FA's Director of Women's Football, and the organisation's strategic lead for disability football, said: "We are very proud of the steps taken over the last year to unlock the growth and visibility of para football, work that could only be done by a hugely dedicated and talented team here at The FA.

"Through the Football Your Way plan, it's our ambition to ensure anyone can be involved in the game, no matter whether they play for the pure enjoyment or have aspirations of one day playing for their country.

"This plan has so much to offer the hugely passionate and talented community of people living with a disability and I'm excited to see it continue to progress over the coming years."

Arsenal dominate under the lights at the Emirates

On an uncharacteristically balmy October night in North London, Arsenal Women extended their unbeaten run in the Women's Champions League as they beat Zurich 3-1 under the lights at the Emirates Stadium.

After beating reigning European champions Lyon 5-1 with a fantastic performance in their opening Group C game the week before, expectations for the Gunners were high. While this game against Zurich wasn't quite as thrilling - Arsenal got the job done.

Jonas Eidevall made several changes to the side that beat Liverpool 2-0 in the league, with Jordan Nobbs, Jen Beattie and Kaylan Marckese among the players who started.

It was a slightly more restrained crowd than some anticipated; less than 6,000 people were in attendance at the Emirates, which usually accommodates crowds 10 times the size. This didn't take anything away from the atmosphere, though, with cheers of "Arsenal FC, are by far the greatest team" erupting around the East Stand

shortly after kick off.

While the Gunners completely dominated the first half, it took 38 minutes to take the lead. Jordan Nobbs scored a brilliant goal on the volley to convert Steph Catley's precision perfect cross from a corner.

When the stalemate was broken, Arsenal's second didn't take long to come. A stunning header by new summer signing Lina Hurtig gave Eidevall's side a very comfortable 2-0 lead just before half-time.

The second half was a little more heated. Zurich were scrappy, challenging with purpose and doing whatever they could to get back in the game.

In the 76th minute, Zurich's Seraina Piubel showed excellent control and composure in front of goal as she scored in stunning fashion, running straight over to the sidelines to celebrate with her teammates and staff.

It didn't take long for Arsenal to regain the upper hand of the game however, with an almost instantaneous response thanks to the Swedish duo Stina Blackstenius and Lina Hurting. Stina forced a save from Zurich's Lourdes Romero with a powerful shot, but Hurtig was there once again to tap in the rebound. Giving her a brace and claiming her second goal at Arsenal.

Overall, both teams put in a great performance, but it was the home side that truly dominated. While Arsenal perhaps didn't quite show the same vigour and flair as they did against the European champions Lyon the week before, they got the job done. After two matches played, Arsenal sit comfortably at the top of their group.

Stand out players were Kim Little, who rarely paused for breath and showed incredible pace, creativity and determination for the ball. CB duo Jen Beattie and Lotte Wubben-Moy were also crucial in the game, both putting in a fantastic shift at the back. It would be hard not to praise Lina Hurtig too, for two brilliant goals that marked her very first for the club. Jordan Nobbs received POTM on the day.

"I'm happy with the result," Jonas Eidevall said in a post-match interview. "But we've only played two games, there's nothing won yet."

A Chelsea corner caused Vllaznia problems in the 18th minute. Guro Reiten put a long range shot over in the 24th minute as the hosts looked to extend their lead. Harder played a nice ball through to Kerr four minutes later but the offside flag had gone up.

The chances continued to come for Chelsea but Harder shot over in the 31st minute. The Dane then headed over a minute later. Reiten skipped passed a defender but her shot was deflected wide in the 34th minute.

Chelsea did score a second in the 37th minute. Reiten's cross took a slight deflection into the path of Kerr who finished from close-range.

Two minutes later and the home side scored a third. Reiten, who was excellent throughout on her 100th appearance for the club, with the assist again when her low cross found Harder who put the ball into the back of the net from 6-yards.

Reiten played a nice through ball to Kerr in the 41st minute but Kaylin Williams-Mosier got there first to claim. Jessie Fleming put a chance just wide a minute later, again Reiten providing the cross. Kerr had the ball in the net again a minute before half time but the offside flag was up this time to deny her.

Chelsea started the second half in the same way by creating chances to extend their lead. Fleming shot over in the 50th minute, and Rytting Kaneryd was unable to control the ball and saw her effort go wide two minutes later. Fleming put another shot over in the 54th minute from 25 -yards out.

It was 4-0 in the 57th minute when Reiten swung in a corner and both Kerr and Eriksson went for the ball, with the final touch looking like it came off Kerr's head to complete her hat-trick.

Eriksson header over a free kick shortly after, before Kerr scored her fourth and Chelsea's fifth in the 60th minute. Reiten got her fourth assist of the evening as she played the ball across and the Australian finished from about 8-yards. The backflip celebration followed, and Kerr became the first player to score four goals in a UEFA Women's Champions League group stage game.

Harder had a chance in the 68th minute but shot over from 25-yards. Beth England was denied by Williams-Mosier a minute later as Chelsea looked to add more.

They did score a sixth in the 72nd minute. England saw her header

from a corner pushed away by Williams-Mosier but Harder was there to put the rebound in and score her second of the game.

Harder headed over in the 76th minute, and two minutes later Chelsea did make it 7-0 when two substitutes combined. Alsu Abdullina's cross was headed in by Svitkova for her first goal for the club after joining from West Ham during the summer.

The Vllaznia fans, who had been singing and chanting throughout, started letting off some flares in the final 10 minutes and there was a slight delay after two of these had been thrown onto the pitch.

Megi Doci had an effort for the visitors in the 87th minute but her free kick from 30 or so yards went wide.

Chelsea scored an eighth in the 88th minute when Harder completed her hat-trick from 6-yards after Svitkova's initial shot had been saved by substitute goalkeeper Viona Rexhepi.

England had two chances in additional time, first heading over then seeing her shot hit the outside of the post. The final whistle went shortly after to signal the end of the match and a high scoring win for Chelsea.

Chelsea general manager Paul Green described it as a 'great perfomance' when speaking to the press afterwards. He described Guro Reiten as "the assist queen" and "gives quality down the left side". About Sam Kerr, he said "she is a natural goalscorer" and that "getting four tonight will give her a lot of confidence and hopefully take into the weekend".

Lionesses: Past and Present

Wembley was buzzing for the England versus USA friendly on Friday, October 7, and Lionesses past were as much a part of the night as Lionesses present.

Before kick-off, focus went from the stars of today, to the stars that paved the way, as The Football Association (FA) marked 50 years of the Lionesses.

Amongst the carnival atmosphere of the post-Euros celebrations, over 100 former Lionesses were welcomed pitch side. Alongside marking Jill Scott's England caps by presenting her with a framed number 161 shirt, and displaying the magnificent Women's Euros trophy, Wembley celebrated the determination. courage and perseverance of the past Lionesses who helped create these moments.

The original Lionesses, who played the very first official international against Scotland in 1972, had not previously been fully recognised by the FA. Although the ban was lifted in 1971, the governing body had never awarded them their international caps. This omission was corrected 50 years later in

front of a 76,893 Wembley crowd. It was a beautiful moment.

Sheila Parker, the 1972 captain, and her team, excitedly received their caps from Jill Scott, proudly waving them for the crowd. In return, Scott thanked them for "paving the way". The emotion was palpable – I doubt I was alone in shedding a tear!

The ex-Lionesses paraded around the pitch at half time: waving, smiling, and soaking up a fantastic Wembley atmosphere. A list of Lionesses past and present was displayed on the big screens and in the programme – showcasing the women who "paved the way" for the current generation of trophy winners.

The First Official International

Scotland hosted that international opener in 1972 at Ravenscraig Stadium, Greenock, on November 18. Scotland raced into a two-goal lead thanks to Mary Carr and Rose Reilly (the second going straight in from a corner) before Sylvia Gore scored England's first goal to make it 2-1 at half-time.

After the break, England scored two more through Lynda Hale

and Jeannie Allott to win the inaugural match 3-2.

Momentum continued through the 1970s and the Lionesses played many friendlies before official international competitions arrived in the 1980s.

Women's Euros: A Brief History

The catchily named "European Competition for Women's Football" was first held in 1984. The 16 teams were split into four groups. England reached the two-legged final with Sweden, losing the first leg 1-0, but winning the second with a Linda Curl goal. They went on to lose on penalties, finishing the first Euros as Runner's up.

England topped their group in Norway in 1987 but finished fourth after again being beaten by Sweden, this time 3-2 in the semi-finals.

Changes in the format meant that a qualifying competition was introduced from 1989. The Lionesses didn't qualify for the next three tournaments, but in 1995 they made good progress. They beat Iceland 4-2 in the quarter finals but were halted by Germany in the semi-finals (6-2). The Lionesses finished an impressive third.

Another format change in 1997 saw an eight-team final tournament introduced. England once more failed to qualify and were further disappointed in 2001 when they finished bottom of their group.

England played host to the 2005 tournament and the Lionesses had high hopes. Record crowds and record TV audiences watched, but the Lionesses could only finish bottom of their group.

They bounced back from their home tournament disappointment though and reached the 2009 final. Germany showed their class, winning convincingly 6-2, but this was a fantastic run for the Lionesses.

Karen Carney and Kelly Smith scored in the final, and goals came from Eni Aluko, Fara Williams, Jill Scott, and Faye White throughout the tournament.

More disappointment followed in 2013 when they failed to get out of the group. A return to form in 2017 saw them reach the semi-finals. They were halted by the eventual winners, The Netherlands – under the guidance of Sarina Wiegman.

Wiegman then switched teams and we all know how the 2022 competition ended!

FIFA Women's World Cup: A Brief History

England didn't qualify for the first World Cup in 1991 but reached the quarter-finals of the 12-team 1995 edition. They bowed out with a 3-0 loss to Germany, but had wins against Canada and Nigeria.

Huge viewing figures, plenty of goals, and the rise of an exceptional USA team marked the 1999 tournament (now featuring 16 teams). It was one to forget for the Lionesses with only one win on the board. They failed to qualify at all in 2003.

Draws against Japan and Germany and a strong win against Argentina (6-1) in 2007, saw England bounce back from recent World Cup disappointment. The USA stopped their run at the quarter-final stage.

The Lionesses topped their group in 2011, beating the eventual winners, Japan, 2-0 on the way. They faced France in the quarter-finals, but a 1-0 lead wasn't enough. France equalised and went on to win 4-3 on penalties.

The Lionesses progressed from the group in 2015, beat Norway 2-1 in the round of 16, and Canada 2-1 in the quarters. A heart-breaking stoppage time own goal would see them bow out against Japan in the semi-finals. They re-grouped to beat Germany in the play-off to come third, thanks to a Fara Williams penalty in extra time.

Their last World Cup outing in 2019 saw them through to the semi-finals. A tightly fought semi against USA ended in heartbreak for the Lionesses. They finished the tournament fourth unable to clinch the bronze medal. Ellen White finished with six goals, narrowly missing out on the Golden Boot.

Past, Present and Future

During most of the last 50 years, women have continued to fight for their right to play.

The fight isn't yet over, but thanks to Lionesses, past and present, things are beginning to change. The Lionesses of 1972 had to wait a long time to receive official recognition (and their caps), but they were always an important part of the games' history; a history that has led to a dazzling present and an exciting future.

Many Lionesses have had the opportunity to dress up for photo shoots and tell their stories to top magazines and newspapers. Lucy Bronze, Ellen White and Keira Walsh have featured in OK! Magazine; Beth Mead was the cover story for The Times Magazine; Mary Earps told her side of things in The Sunday Times Magazine; Jill Scott has been interviewed by The Guardian; and Rachel Daly and Fran Kirby have spoken to The Telegraph.

Jill Scott hasn't stopped since retiring and doesn't look like slowing down any time soon. She's recently been confirmed as a contestant on "I'm a Celebrity...". I can't think of anyone who is going to be more entertaining in the jungle! She's also made her debut as a presenter on Sky Sports (alongside Karen Carney and Kelly Smith); she's started the London Marathon with Leah Williamson and Ellen White; and given out drinks to runners with Anthony Joshua; all alongside taking on more barista duties at her co-owned coffee shop.

Beth Mead has won almost every accolade in Women's football this season but has still found time for off-pitch activities. Top of Beth's list must be getting her book to the publishers—"Lioness: My Journey to Glory" is out on Thursday, November 10.

Lucy Bronze has unveiled the Lego version of the Women's Euros Trophy: made up of 2944 bricks and taking 25 hours to build (fortunately, she didn't have to build it!). It's currently displayed in The National Football Museum in Manchester as part of the "Crossing the Line: the Story of Women's Football" exhibition.

Millie Bright, Leah Williamson and Jill Scott presented the "Returning Drama" award at the recent National Television Awards; Ella Toone and Alessia Russo have been on The Big Breakfast; and Chloe Kelly has been on The Jonathan Ross Show.

To top it all off, the Lionesses have been awarded the "Inspiration Award" at the 2022 Pride of Britain Awards - and rightly so!

England to face Brazil at Wembley

England Lionesses will fact Brazil in the first ever Women's Finalissima at Wembley Stadium this April.

The 2022 European champions are set to face the Copa America Femenina winners, marking another highlight in the growth of women's football in this country.

The clash is set to place on April 6 2023 and will give both sides the chance to lift another trophy

before heading to the World Cup in Australia and New Zealand a few months later.

Wiegman's side are set to face Japan and Norway next month in friendlies as they prepare for another major tournament.

England began their preparations for the 2019 World Cup with a sold-out clash against Brazil in Middlesbrough in October 2018. Then, 30,000 fans watched Fran Kirby score the only goal of the match in a predominantly one-sided affair in which the winning margin arguably should have been bigger.

Sarina Wiegman's side will be looking to head into the 2022 World Cup with similar momentum as they bid to eclipse a fourth-place finish in the 2019 World Cup held in France.

Wiegman announces final 2022 squad

Sarina Wiegman has announced her final squad for 2022 as England prepare to face Japan and Norway.

The 25-player group will take on their fellow 2023 FIFA Women's World Cup finalists at the Pinatar Arena football centre in Murcia.

The fixtures see Japan up first on Friday November 11 (7pm GMT), followed by a meeting with Norway on Tuesday November 15 (7pm GMT).

Included in the squad are uncapped young duo Maya Le Tissier and Katie Robinson while Alessia Russo returns after missing the October camp with injury.

Captain Leah Williamson is still absent having also sat out last month's 2-1 defeat of the United States at Wembley Stadium and 0-0 draw with Czech Republic in Brighton. Niamh Charles and Jordan Nobbs also come back into contention.

"These will again be two good challenging games for us which is just what we want and need at this stage," said Wiegman.

"We will come up against one team in Norway that we know plenty about and who are building again under Hege [Riise]. However, before then we have a tough match against a Japan, who are bringing a different style of play which is a good preparation for the World Cup.

"We are hoping the conditions in Spain will help us to maximise our training as every session counts, along with the matches of course, in helping us to be ready for the World Cup.

"We cannot waste a minute and I am looking forward to getting back on the grass. We have some new players to look at as we know we have so much competition for places coming through."

There has been a lot of press surrounding Hannah Hampton who has not been appearing for England or Aston Villa since September.

Speculation had been ripe about her behaviour but a statement from the goalkeeper appeared to dismiss those.

She said: "I've been suffering with an ongoing medical issue for a while and it's time to address it with a small procedure.

"I will be out for a few weeks now as I recover with the support of everyone at the club."

Wiegman commented on the ongoing situation saying: "I haven't spoken to her myself. We made a

plan, she is at the club and taking care of that."

"It is difficult to digest in this moment, we need to take some time.

"You learn from everything you do. The more we progress, the more challenging it will be. We will pick up every individual in this group and we will come back together."

With Cliftonville Ladies being crowned champions for the first time ever in their club history, I look back at the North Belfast club and how they have risen to the dizzy heights of Irish Premiership Champions 2022.

Cliftonville Ladies were roughly formed in 2006, although no one is quite sure as such was the lack of interest in the women's game back then.

A red revolution began though on the back of the pandemic, when the women's premiership was granted elite status, this was the turning point for Cliftonville.

Former manager of the women's team and head of Women's Football at Solitude, Martin Douglas stepped in to coach the women along with Brendan Lynch and John McGrady in the last few games of the 2020 season.

The board then backed the plan to replicate the model from the men's section into the women's section. The club hasn't looked back since.

Standards were set high, how players trained, what they wore, how they conducted themselves on and off the pitch, all these things were set in place.

There was a now a certain ethos and culture at the club. Coaching was of the highest standard which included former player, Clare Carson, who retired from playing in 2020.

Glentoran ladies who have been so dominant continued to be, winning back-to-back titles in 2020 and 21 but Cliftonville were getting closer when they were narrowly pipped to the post by Glentoran in 2021.

That hurt stayed with Cliftonville and rebuilding continued.

An extensive recruitment programme began, attracting players like Louise McDaniel.

Having spent time in England and Scotland, she returned home and was so impressed with the running of Cliftonville that she decided to sign.

Another factor was the growth and success of the NI international team, many of whom play for Clintonville.

Marissa Callaghan, who has been at the club for 20 years, alongside additional signings in 2021 such as Danielle Maxwell, Vickey Carleton, Abbie Magee, Kirsty and Caitlin McGuiness and Kelsie Burrows. provided genuine quality in the squad, and soon there was the real basis of a developing team.

Another integral part of their success has been the development of the youth at the club. Toni -Leigh Finnegan, Rachel Norney and Grace McKimm to name but a few, are young players who are developing massively under the regime, and are benefitting hugely from playing alongside such quality and experienced players.

With the players in place, and a new determination to drive the team forward, Cliftonville also took advantage of a crucial factor, and that was the consistency of their facilities.

With the club having a 4G pitch, the women's team had access to the exact same facilities as the men, thus not only allowing for a feeling of equality and inclusion, but also providing them with surface to develop an attacking style of play, that has proved to be irresistible throughout the season

So, recruiting well, a strong management team, strengthening the squad and the hurt that was felt along with a team who not only are close friends on the pitch but are also good friends off it has meant that Cliftonville eventually have found the right recipe for success and my guessing is that this won't be the last Premiership trophy they will be lifting.

Northern Ireland to face Italy in friendly

Northern Ireland will face Italy in their final match of 2022.

The friendly will end a memorable year for Kenny Shiels' side after their history-making performances at the Women's European Championships in the summer.

The game will be held at Seaview Stadium in Belfast—the home of the Crusaders on Tuesday, November 15.

Italy have recently qualified for next summers FIFA Women's World Cup in Australia and New Zealand.

Boss Shiels said: "We will relish the challenge against our Italian counterparts.

"The stronger the opposition, the more valuable an experience it will be for our players.

Spain retain U17 World Cup

Spain won the FIFA U17 Women's World Cup last month after a 1-0 win over Colombia in the final.

It looked to be a stalemate finale between the South Americans and the Europeans until the 82nd minute where an own goal from Colombia's Ana Maria Guzman Zapata awarded Spain their second ever crown at a Women's Under-17 World Cup.

The win over Colombia secured Spain's back to back triumph of U17 World Cups after winning the last one four years ago in Uruguay where they beat Mexico (2-1).

2022 has proved to be a successful year for the Spanish women's national team as it all begun in August when their U20s side won their first ever World Cup in Costa Rica. A few weeks ago, Spanish player Alexia Putellas picked up her second straight FIFA Ballon d'Or and now the U17 squad have added to that with world glory.

The FIFA President, Gianni Infantino, was in attendance for the final which was taking place at the DY Patil Stadium in Mumbai, India.

As well as Infantino, an attendance of nearly 25,000 were there to spectate on Spain's late dramatic win over Colombia.

The final did not really get going until the 21st minute when Spain struck the target first as a 30 yard right footed shot by Cristina Libran was tipped over the bar by Colombia's goalkeeper of Luisa Agudelo.

Seven minutes later had Colombia throw in their first real chance as it all started from a corner in the near side. The delivery into the six yard box would be punched away by Spain's goal stopper, Sofia Fuente, then moments later at the receiving end of the clearance Natalia Hernandez placed a volley just over the target while the goalkeeper was off her lines. Spain were able to breathe again knowing they were inches off going behind in a World Cup final.

The momentum stuck with Colombia over 11 minutes before the half time break, Linda Caicedo picked up a low ball pass from the right hand side before fancying a shot at goal that did rattle Fuente as she didn't catch the ball originally but recovered to avoid any problems with the rebounded efforts from her opponents.

Caicedo continued to get busy up front for Colombia as she ran in for a loose ball on its way into Spain's penalty area, she would outpace her opponent but lost the ball to Fuente where the team in yellow called for a penalty. The referee, Katia Garcia, ignored the claims and no penalty was given.

The score line was goal less at the break as Colombia looked the more likely to break the deadlock but instead it was Spain that would beat them to it just two minutes into the second half. Jone Amezaga ran down the right wing to then cross a low ball across the face of the goal to find her team mate Libran who tapped the ball in at close range. The Spain players started to celebrate the breakthrough, but not long after the referee disallowed the goal after a VAR check due to a handball in build up to the goal from Libran.

14 minutes from time and Colombia were very close to opening the scoring when substitute Karla Viancha went up for a loose ball in the air against Fuente. Both players collided but the last ditch header from Viancha directed the ball into the side netting. Fuente timed getting contact with the ball just right as if she was a second later, a penalty could have been awarded.

Spain's next attack with just over eight minutes left on the clock would start with a run down the right wing followed by a cross into the penalty area. Spain's substitute of Laia Martret miss kicked the delivery but luck was on her side when her shot deflected off Ana Guzman in the six-yard box and then the ball slowly rolled across the line.

The Spaniards took the lead thanks to the fortune of a deflection that would classify as an own goal for young Guzman. Stefania Perlaza tried to clear it in time but she just wasn't quick enough. The winning goal was decided by milliseconds.

Colombia were not done yet as a free kick shortly after the goal started with a long ball into the box as two shots at goal were both blocked by the captain of Marina Artero.

Exactly two seconds before the 90 and Spain missed out on the opportunity to put the game to bed as Martret hit the post.

That proved to be the last goal chance in the game as Spain finished up as the victors.

Women's World Cup Draw puts everything into place

month, New Zealand Last **FIFA** hosted the 2023 Women's World Cup draw as the competing nations found out whom they would face at the finals.

Every football draw event is always full of excitement with many asking the question of 'who will get who?' as at least 29 participant representatives attended the ceremony at the Aotea Centre in Auckland on the evening of Saturday

October 22nd.

Familiar faces attended the draw including England Manager Sarina Wiegman, ex-World Cup winning manager of Jill Ellis and let's not forget Arsenal legend Ian Wright who was one of the draw members on stage.

Wright's enthusiasm and influence in the world of women's football over the last couple of decades was great to see a figure like him to be part of the draw.

His role was to determine either which group position each nation would get in groups E or F. He had no responsibility in England's involvement of the draw as the Lionesses were drawn into Group D.

Hosting the draw included Carli Lloyd who we all know was part of the USWNT team that had won the last two World Cups in Canada 2015

and France 2019. Lloyd certainly enjoyed talking about her recent nation's success as being the most successful country in the history of the Women's World Cup.

Going into the draw, all 32 participants were arranged into four different pots which all came down to the latest FIFA women's world rankings days before the date of the draw.

29 teams had cemented their places for next summer's finals but there are still three places to be determined. The final three places will not be decided until the inter-confederation play-offs take place on February 18th-23rd in New Zealand. 10 teams will compete for only the three spots left available.

Draw Highlights

The main highlight of the draw has got to be the repeat of the 2019 Women's World Cup final of the USA versus the Netherlands in group E.

The moment Netherlands were put into the same as the world champions, straight away the presenters (including Carli Lloyd) and the audiences gasped while realizing that there was an opportunity for the Dutch to aim at revenge over the Americans.

Netherlands, who were managed by England's Sarina Wiegman at the time, fell short to Jill Ellis' USA in Lyon to accept being runners-up just two years after winning the UEFA Women's Euros.

The game ended 2-0 to the USA as Megan Rapinoe opened the scoring from the penalty spot followed by a game ending goal by Rose Lavelle 21 minutes from time.

Co-hosts Australia were given quite a challenging opening stages to their home World Cup campaign in group B as they will face Canada, Nigeria and Republic of Ireland. Some are describing group B as the 'group of death' and possibly the hardest group the Matildas have been given.

Canada are currently the Olympic champions after striking gold at last year's Tokyo games. The Canadians also beat Australia not once but twice recently in back-to-back games in September even though the maple leafs had an understrength squad.

Bev Priestmann's side are the highest -ranked opponent (seventh) Australia could have drawn from their pot.

The Republic of Ireland were the third-highest ranked team in their pot (24th), but beat Australia last year.

Finally Nigeria who complete the group are the most successful African nation in women's football and are not a force to be messed with as this is a team that features Barcelona's Asisat Oshoala up front.

England's World Cup Dream

The success of last summer with England will of course create a new standard of expectancy for Wiegman and her team to continue this glory run of bidding for major international trophies.

Plus the recent friendly win over the world champions at Wembley Stadium just shows that the Lionesses could arguably be the best team in the world right now.

After the recent draw, the team now know what possible routes are available to them if they are going to go all the way next summer and become world champions for the first time in their history.

England's group D is not one to be comfortable with as this includes this year's Asian Cup winners of China and Denmark that has a host of experienced names like Pernille Harder.

Their play-off winner opponent will of course not be known until next year but it could possibly be either Chile, Senegal or Haiti. Whoever comes out of that will be expected to be the easier opponent.

England's start to the tournament is against the play-off winner on July 22nd in Brisbane followed by Denmark in Sydney six days later. They then wrap up the group stages against China in Adelaide on August 1st.

A top two finish in the group will get them into the last 16 against one of the teams of group B, so that could be hosts Australia, Canada, Nigeria or Ireland. Having their group linked up with the 'group of death' is a tough one for England but this is the World Cup at the end of the day.

An exciting challenge ahead for the Lionesses down-under.

Heartbreak for Wales and Scotland in World Cup Play-offs

Both Wales and Scotland missed out on a Women's World Cup spot after losing their play-off games last month.

A last minute extra time winner from Switzerland's Fabienne Humm caused utter heartbreak for the Wales national team as their bid to reach their first ever World Cup finals was dashed away.

For Scotland it was a home defeat to neighbours Republic of Ireland at Hampden Park as the only goal in the game from Amber Barrett in the 72nd minute was enough to upset the hosts, who had hoped to qualify for a second straight World Cup after 2019.

The wins for Switzerland and Republic of Ireland guaranteed them a spot at next summer's World Cup as they earnt enough points for the two automatic spots in the play-offs.

For Portugal however, even though they beat Iceland in extra time they did not have enough points for the top two spots in the three-team table. Instead, they will have to settle for February's Inter-confederation play-offs that will take place in New Zealand.

Portugal will await for whoever wins in group A's semi-final between Cameroon and Thailand since they have been automatically placed in the play-off final. That World Cup spot decider will be played on February 22nd in Hamilton.

Switzerland and Ireland of course entered last month's Women's World Cup draw in New Zealand. Ireland were placed in group B as some are calling it 'the group of death' with hosts Australia, Canada and Nigeria. The Swiss will be in group A along with co-hosts New Zealand, Norway and Philippines.

The dream target of reaching a major international tournament looked very possible for the red dragons when they beat Bosnia and Herzegovina in round one in Cardiff. They had to wait until extra time to find the winning goal thanks to Jess Fishlock who found the target after going behind the Bosnia defence when collecting a free kick delivery into the 18-yard box from

the right wing. Fishlock was unmarked and timed the run perfectly to volley the ball into the top left corner of the net, it just had to be from the most capped player for Wales.

The last hurdle was then a trip to Zurich where the hosts of Switzerland were waiting. An away match against a team that reached the quarterfinals at the last World Cup had the Swiss as match favourites to advance. However, the script took a twist just 19 minutes in as Rhiannon Roberts tapped in the opening goal after receiving a flick header in the six-yard box – it was a dream start for the visitors.

Seconds before half time and Switzerland had responded as Ramona Bachmann struck the roof of the Wales net from inside the penalty area. Wales would have to go again but as the game went into extra time, it looked as though Gemma Grainger's tactics were for her team to defend until the very end and force the game into a penalty shootout. The plan nearly worked but in the last kick of extra time, the hosts made a breakthrough when Geraldine Reuteler created a low ball cross from the left wing only to be squeezed in on the near post by Humm to end Wales' World Cup dreams for another four years.

Scotland also had to win in round one before a round two play-off to determine a World Cup finals spot.

They were up against a very well experienced Austria side who are known for being a difficult team to crack down and to score past. That proved to be the case as the only goal in the tie was on the 92nd minute in extra time, a header from a corner by Abigail Harrison put them ahead and was enough to beat the Austrians in front of a home crowd at Hampden Park.

They would stay put in Glasgow a few days later to host Ireland in hopes of another evening win under the floodlights. The repeat request was denied by the visitors around 18 minutes before the 90 as Barrett completed a through ball pass down the middle to then slot it home with her right foot.

Scotland couldn't respond in time which ended a night to forget for both home nations.

Arnold Clark Cup opponents announced

The Arnold Clark Cup is coming back once again in the new year and the countries competing have been announced.

England won the inaugural event back in February and will compete once again the second edition of the tournament.

The tournament organisers took to social media over a 48 hour period to announce who England will face with the three competitors all making their debuts.

South Korea, Belgium and Italy will all be coming to England to play in the tournament.

Italy are the highest ranked in the Fifa World Rankings (after England) at 14th, with South Korea 17th and Belgium 20th.

Whilst Italy and South Korea have secured their place in the 2023 Women's World Cup in Australia and France, Belgium were knocked out by Portugal in the first round of play-offs.

When will the matches be played?

The games will be held between February 16 -22, 2023 during the international window.

It has not been announced yet which venues will host games but last year they were played at the Riverside Stadium, Middlesbrough, Carrow Road in Norwich and Molineux Stadium in Wolverhampton.

Portland Thorns reign supreme

A record-breaking play-offs in the season's National Women's Soccer League run-in set the tone for none other than the Portland Thorns to add another piece of silverware to their trophy cabinet.

Having won the Championship in 2013 and 2017, the Thorns added their third with a 2-0 win over Kansas City Current, at the Audi Field, Washington DC, on October 30, thanks to goals from 22-year-old Sophia Smith, and an own-goal (Addisyn Merrick).

Prior to the seasonal showpiece, taking its place on Prime Time TV, the Current had to navigate the full lottery of the play-offs, defeating first Houston Dash (2-1) in the quarter-finals, then the NWSL Shield winners, OL Reign (2-0) in the semis.

On the other side of the draw, San Diego Wave defeated Chicago Red Stars 2-1 in extra-time, before losing to Portland Thorns, by the same score-line, in the semis; it was the attendances that lit up the league's status however.

The 2022 NWSL Play-Offs set the largest attendances in the leagues short, yet exciting history, as popularity continues to grow; and, with all four play-off attendances topping the 20,000 mark, atmosphere was certainly created.

A league record, 26, 215 attendance, was set in the quarterofinal match-up between the Wave, and Red Stars, Ballon D'Or nominee, Alex Morgan, netting an extra-time winner for the Wave in a game

which would actually see the Red Stars have more possession, produce more passes, and have more corners.

Regarding the other three, play-off matches, the semi-final between the Thorns and the Wave would see 22,635 in attendance, the other semi, between Reign and Current, saw 21, 491, whilst the second quarter-final match, between the Dash, and eventual runners-up, the Current, be in front of 21, 284.

The final itself, in front of 17, 624, meanwhile bore witness to a dominant, Thorns performance, one which was capped, as early as the fourth minute, thanks to final MVP, and the youngest scorer in an NWSL final, Sophia Smith, following a defensive slip-up.

The Thorns striker was played through the centre of defence, one which couldn't handle her, leaving her one-on-one with Adrianna Franch, who Smith casually rounded and slotted home; credit to the Current, they had their chances, but failed to capitalise, including one from Kate Del Fava, who saw hers bounce over the crossbar.

The second goal arrived early in the second period with the Thorns splitting their opposition open in just four passes before a final cross into the box, from Yazmeen Ryan caused mass confusion in defence, and, with the ball slipping beneath Franch, Addisyn Merrick was onhand to supply the final touch, and with it an own-goal.

Chances still flowed, mainly for the Thorns, as they went on to become the first, three-time NWSL Championship winners, their eighth trophy in their ten year existence.

As for those Ballon D'Or nominees, three of the final twenty, won by Barcelona's Alexis Patellas, were American – ninth place was taken by a Brazilian-born American, who plies her trade in France, Lyon's Antonia Maciano; thirteenth was Orlando Pride/San Diego Wave player, Alex Morgan; and in eighteenth, an individual named Trinity Rodman, of the Washington Spirit, the 20-year-old daughter of NBA legend, Dennis Rodman.

The NWSL end-of-season awards meanwhile would see Sophia Smith, who else, take home the league MVP, Alex Morgan won the Golden Boot having netted fifteen times, Kailen Sheridan is the Goalkeeper of the Year, and Naomi Girma claimed both the Defender, and the Rookie of the Year awards.

The San Diego Wave also added the Coach of the Year award, making it five for them overall (and three in the team of the year), English-born Casey Stoney, increasing her stock at the forefront of the women's game; Stoney, a former Arsenal and Liverpool defender, played over 100 times for England before turning to management, fully, in 2018, with Manchester United, arriving in San Diego in 2021.

Irish celebrations marred by controversy

Qualification for a tournament, irrespective of what that may be, should ultimately be a joyous occasion; when said tournament is your country going to the World Cup finals for the first time, unbridled joy should be at the forefront.

Now, spare a thought for Vera Pauw and her Republic of Ireland side, and the situation in which they found themselves following a successful qualification campaign for the 2023 Women's World Cup in Australia/New Zealand.

A 1-0 victory over rivals Scotland, in Glasgow, on Tuesday 11 October, courtesy of a goal from Amber Barrett, in the 72 minute, certainly sparked joyous scenes among the Irish — on the field, on the touchline, in the stands, and back home.

However, it was to be amidst the post-game celebrations, in the Irish dressing room, where the plot most certainly thickened, and with it, mass controversy, and numerous investigations.

Those celebrations, captured on video as it happens so often in this, the modern, digital age, would see the Green Army providing a rendition of a song entitled 'Ooh, ah, up the Ra' – this however, is something which is often used in a declaration of support for the Irish Republican Army (IRA). As far as stirring up a hornets nest goes, this became a rather wild one, and quite quickly.

The FAI (Football Association of Ireland) and Coach Pauw, along

with players Aine O'Gorman and Chloe Mustaki, were fast seen to be issuing apologies, whilst the player who'd uploaded the afore-mentioned video the night before was "devastated and crying in her room."

The said statements read as follows, from the FAI, on the Wednesday (12 October) morning, apologising "for any offense caused by the song sung by players in the Ireland dressing room after the FIFA Women's World Cup qualification play-off win over Scotland at Hampden Park on Tuesday night."

Whilst Vera Pauw, who has been involved in the beautiful game since the seventies, and has managed, among others, both Scotland, and her home nation, the Netherlands, added: "We apologise from the bottom of our hearts to anyone who has been offended by the context of the post-match celebrations after we had just qualified for the World Cup.

"We will review this with the players and remind them of their responsibilities in this respect.

"I have spoken with the players this morning (12 October) and we are sorry collectively for any hurt caused, there can be no excuse for that."

The nature of those celebrations, of the use of that particular song, brought forth commentary from a number of outlets, individuals including Doug Beattie (Ulster Unionist Party, UUP Leader), Michelle O'Neill (Sinn Fein vice president), and Austin Stack (son of a prison officer killed by the IRA).

As for UEFA themselves, European football's governing body have since opened an investigation into the incident, the following, initial statement, having been released: "In accordance with Article 31(4) of the UEFA Disciplinary Regulations, a UEFA Ethics and Regulatory Inspector will investigate potential inappropriate behaviour by players of the Republic of Ireland Women's team in the aftermath of the 2023 **FIFA** World Women's Cup qualifiers play-off second round match played against Scotland on 11 October 2022."

In addition to all of that, Scottish Police have opened their own investigations into the incident; however, from a footballing perspective, how did the Republic of Ireland Women get to this point, qualifying for their first ever, World Cup finals.

It's been over a year, just, since the qualification process began for the Irish, losing 1-0 at home to Sweden, on 21 October 2021, the only loss of their qualification campaign, before going on to win 2-1 away to Finland in their next outing.

In finishing second, to Sweden, the Irish would be seen to win five and draw two, of their eight games, including putting twenty past a beleaguered Georgia, over the two meetings — Megan Connolly meanwhile would be seen to score Ireland's first qualifying goal, nine minutes into the victory over Finland.

Meanwhile, either side of the 1-1 draw with Sweden, Georgia were well-and-truly put to the sword, winning 11-0 at home, and 9-0 away; 'keeper Courtney Brosnan bagging a pair of clean sheets, whilst the goals, they were shared about as Denise O'Sullivan scored three in the first game, Katie McCabe matched O'Sullivan with the same in the second (added to her brace in the first), with Louise Quinn also helping herself to two goals.

The group stage finished with a 1-0 win over Slovakia, before the trip to Hampden Park, and that play-off success, Ireland qualifying alongside fellow play-off winners, Switzerland, and Portugal.

Ireland's (5-4-1) line-up for that date with destiny was that of –

Courtney Brosnan; Louise Quinn, Niamh Fahey, Megan Campbell, Diane Caldwell, Jamie Finn; Denise O'Sullivan, Katie McCabe, Lily Agg, Aine O'Gorman; Heather Payne (Amber Barrett, 62)

The story in question though, overshadowing what should, and is, a joyous occasion, could rumble on somewhat, UEFA dependant; Pauw meanwhile, is aware of the consequences, and the damage, already cause.

"We did something wrong," the Dutch-born manager recently stated.

"As soon as you hurt one person, you've done something wrong.

"But the players didn't mean anything......

"We are always there to be role models for others.

"Such a shame that this happened because nobody meant anything with it....

"There is a UEFA investigation, which is correct, because there was a claim in it, and we need to face what's coming.

"But let me be clear, there's no excuses and I hope that we've learned from it that you can sing the song your team is embracing, but you have to know your background."

The Republic of Ireland's reward for qualification, as investigations rumble on in the background, is spot in Group B, alongside the co-hosts, Australia (face on 20 July, Sydney), as well as Canada (25 July, Perth), and Nigeria (31 July, Brisbane) — a tough group indeed.



Torrecilla discusses cancer diagnosis

In the hard-hitting and emotional film, Virginia talks in depth about her cancer diagnosis in the spring of 2020. This began with a series of headaches and neck pain which encouraged her to undergo a scandoctors discovered it was a brain tumour.

Virginia said: "They told me I would have to undergo 30 round of radiotherapy and 15 round of chemo. The first thing I thought was: Am I dying?"

Virginia also talks about facing her biggest challenge to date - whilst making progress with her cancer recovery, on June 3, 2021, Virginia and her mother were in a car accident which subsequently left her mother paralyzed from the waist down.

Virginia shared: "I felt like it was all my fault. If I could turn back time, I would go through cancer not just give, but seven or ten times if it meant my mum could walk again today."

Following the crash, Virginia almost quit football but was encouraged by her parents to follow her dreams. She said: "It was really difficult to see my Mum in a wheelchair. I told them that I wanted to quit football. And do you know what they said? They said no. That if I quit football, it would kill them. And I then realised that I had to keep going to achieve my dreams, and especially theirs, which was to be the Virginia I was before."

Six months later, Virginia returned to the game she loves and reminisces in the documentary about being selected for the Atletico de Madrid squad again. On January 23, she featured as a substitute in the SuperCup final against FC Barcelona and didn't expect to play but was delighted to make her emotional return on the 85th minute.

Torrecilla was given a standing ovation from both set of fans before being welcomed back by Barcelona captain and friend, Alexia Putellas – she also received the captain's armband from team-mate, Amanda Sampedro.

Virginia remembers: "The moment I stepped up to the sideline, Alexia came over and gave me a hug. She said 'I'm so happy that you're back.' And when I got a Messi-style embrace - they chanted my name, the rival team applauded me, me teammates were hugging me. When Amanda gave me the captain's armband, I had goosebumps."

Home Nations players around the world

Welcome to our latest version of keeping up to date with our homegrown players who are representing teams overseas.

October was a mix of club and international football for most players as the World Cup qualifications took place including the play-offs.

Many of the players out to represent the countries of their births hoping to be wearing their shirt in proudness come next summer when the tournament takes place in Australia and New Zealand between July 20th and August 20th.

Let's take a look at how some of the local faces have been getting on since we last checked up on them in our last magazine.

Jess Fishlock – Wales and OL Reign

October was a bittersweet period for Jess Fishlock.

It started so well in Wales' play-off campaign when Fishlock herself scored the winning goal in extra time to beat Bosnia and Herzegovina.

The win helped the red dragons advance to the final stage of the play-offs away to Switzerland.

The most capped player for Wales witnessed her team go ahead within the opening 20 minutes in Zurich but Switzerland turned it around and won the match with literally the last kick in extra time to break Welsh hearts.

Fishlock returned to her club, OL Reign, in the United States to start in a 0-2 home defeat to Kansas City in the NWSL. However, OL Reign finished at the top of the table by a single point ahead of Portland Thorns.

Caroline Weir – Scotland and Real Madrid

A very similar path to Fishlock as Caroline Weir was hoping to get Scotland into a second straight appearance at a Women's World Cup finals.

It was the perfect start to their play -off campaign when an extra time winner against Austria at Hampden Park came from Abigail Harrison. All of that glorious drama happening before they were to play another home fixture, this time with Republic of Ireland.

Scotland of course had the home advantage as Weir was yet again in the starting line-up but her side could not repeat what they did a few nights before. Ireland found the winning goal 18 minutes before the final whistle from Amber Barrett that stunned the home crowd in Glasgow.

However, days later and Weir looked to have forgotten about what had happened by scoring a brace for Real Madrid in a very comfortable 7-0 win over Alaves in Primera Division.

Georgia Stanway – England and Bayern Munich

The England and Bayern Munich midfielder had a great start to October when being part of the Lionesses team that beat the world champions, USA, in an international friendly at Wembley Stadium on October 7th.

Stanway scored the winning goal by slotting the ball home from the penalty spot to have the game finish at 2-1. It was quite the statement to the world of football that night as England are one of the main contenders to win the World Cup next year.

Just before the end of last month, Stanway embraced Champions League football under the lights as she secured a brace for Bayern in their away win at Benfica.

The last 10 minutes of the match was a dramatic one as Stanway's late duo of goals on the 83rd and 90th minute turned the score line around from 2-1 to 2-3.

A memorable evening and we forgot to mention Stanway's goals in Portugal were her first goals for the German giants.



Irish National League brings the excitement on final day

of the most conclusions to a domestic season came on the closing weekend of October in the Republic of Ireland.

The Women's National League comprises of ten teams from around the country, with the season running in line with the men's league - starting in March finishing in November. and Founded in 2011, it is the only women's top-level league in the country and Wexford Youths currently hold the crown for most titles with four trophies under their belt.

A multitude of players from the WNL have represented Ireland on the international stage and the league can certainly be a stepping stone to a higher level of football, for example the Women's Super League and beyond. One of the biggest names to come out of the league in recent years is Peamount United's Stephanie Roche who was runner-up for the FIFA Puskas Award in 2014. Her incredible technical volley scored Wexford's Ferrycarrig Park that year secured her the honour with a 33% vote, falling just shy of Columbian James Rodriguez' strike against Uruguay at the 2014 World Cup in Brazil.

Dubliner Roche spread her wings and racked up 58 appearances for the national side while securing game time with Houston Dash, Sunderland and ASPTT Albi in France before returning Peamount in 2020 where she continues to play a vital role.

WNL is an intensely competitive league, with each game renowned for being edgy and unpredictable. Of course, there are certain teams who are dominant year-on-year, but this season threw up quite the surprise in Athlone Town. The County Westmeath team showed a true togetherness throughout the season, with a consistent approach to climbing up the table. Their previous two attempts left them in seventh place after entering the league in 2020, but their manager Tommy Hewitt integral role in played an uncovering the talent within the

Following yet another battling season, the finale came down to the wire. South-east side Wexford would play Dubliners Shelbourne, with Athlone also in contention after their unexpected season of success.

The points tally was so tight that if Wexford won, the title was theirs. If Shelbourne won, the title was theirs. If the teams drew, and Athlone were to draw or lose, it was Shelbourne's title. If the teams drew and Athlone won their game against Bohemians, then Athlone would need to play a final play-off with Shelbourne to decide the ultimate winner.

A vibrant crowd of 929 people came to support both Wexford and Shelbourne in what was a colossal attendance. Women's football in Ireland is not yet at the level it hopes to be, however with the backing of the national broadcaster TG4, who were airing this particular game, combined with the excitement over the nation recently qualifying for their first World Cup things are set to look up for women's sport in the country.

The game itself was as tense as expected in the first half - with chances being missed, nerves setting in and frustrations on show. The first goal came just before half time when the visitors took a hard-fought lead thanks to Jessie Stapleton's tap-in.

The Dubliners continued in their quest to collect their second consecutive league title when they came out fighting in the second half. Megan Smyth-Lynch, Abbi Larkin and Alex Kavanagh all netted throughout the remaining 45 minutes to leave Ferrycarrig Park with a comfortable 4-0 win and another title under their belts.

Meanwhile in Athlone, their 2-1 away win to Dublin side Bohemians was not enough to secure them a highly anticipated title, but they can be incredibly proud of their performances throughout campaign.

Shelbourne manager Noel King spoke gracefully of his team after the game, saying:

"They're a great bunch of players who manage themselves, they look after themselves and they are as professional as any professional even though they are amateur. They're a joy to work with."

To have such an exciting end to a league season is seismic for women's football in Ireland. The crowd reflected this; overtaking Wexford's attendance record for the men's team this season which stood at 818 in a derby draw against neighbours Waterford FC. Attendances across the board in Ireland are a hot topic, with an evident struggle to get people through the gates on a Friday night or Saturday evening. There are many factors; the dominance and easy access to the English Premier League, a leading interest in other sports such as rugby and Gaelic games, and a scarcity of backing from governing bodies. It was, however, incredible to see such support for the WNL and 2023 is sure to be an even more thrilling season.

Strikes cause disruption in Liga F

A referee strike caused the opening round of matches to be postponed, the league has found a new title sponsor and the situation involving the national team seems no closer to a happy resolution but football is (finally) being played, goals are being scored and Barcelona are still winning all the time.

As Liga F approaches the quarter stage of the season it seems a fair time to start judging where teams are, who looks good, the struggling sides and what's to come in the next few weeks.

The Top:

There's no surprise to see Jonatan Giráldez' Barcelona side leading the way with a perfect 7 wins from 7, 25 goals scored and just 2 conceded. There might be no sign of Barça's domestic dominance coming to an end but there are signs that a team from outside the usual suspects could be challenging for "best of the rest", or at least giving rest", or themselves a chance at a maiden Champions League berth. Headed by María Pry, Madrid CFF sit in 3rd place with a lone defeat coming against leaders. Sandwiched by local giants Real (2nd, on goal difference) and Atletico (two points behind in 4th), with the Granotes of Levante in 5th it's been a fantastic start for a team whose current best finish is 7th, set last season.

The Bottom:

If the top of the table is headed by a side with a perfect record then in the interest of balance the bottom placed side probably should be one sat on an imperfect record and unfortunately for Liga F newcomers Alhama that's the case, the Murcia side still pointless though 7 games. Joining Alhama in the relegation zone, and on just one point, are Alaves who recently disposed of manager Mikel Crespo as they look to climb up the table. Just outside the bottom two, Real Betis & Villarreal will be looking over their shoulders, each picking up a solitary win and draw, with 5 defeats each to start the season.

In Between:

A win and a draw either side of a loss to Champions League chasing Atletico Madrid has carried Athletic Club (Bilbao) slightly further away from the relegation zone after a shaky start. Granadilla extended their run to 7 consecutive top 10 finishes last season but find themselves in 11th in the early stages of this campaign. Whilst Sevilla, Levante Las Planas & Huelva find themselves in 8th, 9th & 10th, there is a gap opening up to Valencia (7th) & Real Sociedad (6th).

Who Has Impressed:

Brazil and Atletico Madrid forward Ludmila sits alone as the league's top goalscorer through the early stages of the season, hitting 6 goals in 7 games, already matching her total for the entire 2021-22 season. With a career high of 15 league goals set in 2020-21, it's safe to say her sights will be set on surpassing that mark and helping Atletico back towards the Champions League after missing out in recent years.

Ludmila's national team teammate Geyse Ferreira has already adapted well to life at Barcelona after swapping Madrid CFF for the Catalan super side in the summer and is hot on the heels of Ludmila, as well as Nahikari Garcia (Real Madrid), Amaiur (Real Sociedad) & Alba Redondo (Levante) in the race for the Golden Boot.

At the other end of the pitch it feels right to give recognition to the performance of Barcelona's Gemma Font, even with a more than stellar defence in front of her it's never easy for a "second choice" goalkeeper to come into a team. Conceding just 1 goal in 4 games during Sandra Paños' injured spell, it's a fine example of the depth Barça have and a testament to how Font has played, to the degree that there's a real question over who should be first choice now.

Upcoming:

Looking at the fixtures for the next few weeks there's an obvious one that'll jump out to everyone...El Clásico, the unstoppable Barcelona travel to their eternal rivals, and fellow unbeaten side, Real Madrid this Sunday (at press time) in what's sure to be another thrilling encounter as Real look to finally overcome the biggest hurdle.

Elsewhere in November there's meetings of the Valencian & Basque Derbies between Levante & Valencia and Athletic Bilbao & Real Sociedad respectively on the 19th, the Seville Derby between Sevilla and Real Betis a day later and other big clashes such as Madrid Atletico hosting Barcelona on the 27th, along with Madrid CFF's attempts to keep up their current pace and Alhama's search for points.



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
